Monday June 1st, Feast of The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

Today we have a new feast, so new it is not even in the recent editions of the Missals. It is another Feast celebrating Mary, and this time in her role as Mother of the Church. The Gospel for this feast comes from St. John 19:19:25-27:

Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her, 'Woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.

John resents the Church being given Mary as our Mother, and we in turn can take our Blessed Mother Mary into our homes and our hearts, praying though her intersession to her Son for all our needs.

Mother, help our faith!

Open our ears to hear God's word and to recognize his voice and call.

Awaken in us a desire to follow in his footsteps,

to go forth from our own land and to receive his promise.

Help us to be touched by his love, that we may touch him in faith.

Help us to entrust ourselves fully to him and to believe in his love, especially at times of trial, beneath the shadow of the cross, when our faith is called to mature.

Sow in our faith the joy of the Risen One.

Remind us that those who believe are never alone.

Teach us to see all things with the eyes of Jesus, that he may be light for our path.

And may this light of faith always increase in us,

until the dawn of that undying day which is Christ himself, your Son, our Lord!

And let today's hymn be 'Sing of Mary, Pure and Lowly.' It's a lovely hymn, the first verse being about Mary, the second about Jesus, and the third a doxology, a final prayer for the Trinity. I always think there should be another verse about Joseph's role in the Holy Family of Nazareth. Perhaps I'll get around to writing one, or perhaps any poets out there could have a crack at it.

More news about opening Churches; the Community Secretary Robert Jenrick has apparently been in talks with religious leaders about opening Churches. Obviously there is talk of social distancing, cordoning off areas, and so on, as well has having no singing. He said, 'We certainly don't want large gatherings in places of worship particularly because of the demographic in some faiths, because of singing hymns and so on, which can lead to exhalation, can create particular problems. I understand how important it is for millions of people in this country. I can understand how people of faith would consider it strange that shops, cafes, pubs, restaurants, many other settings, might be open in the weeks and months ahead, but not somewhere as important as a place of worship.' read into all of that what you will.
