Thursday May 14th, The Feast of St. Matthias

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the advice from the government and the medics about what we should be doing in this time of crisis.

And I hope everyone is praying together for our all our intentions in this time of need.

Today is the Feast of the Apostles St. Matthias. He is first introduced to us in today's first reading, Acts 1:15-17. 20-26. Peter takes the lead in deciding on a replacement for Judas to bring the apostolic group back up to twelve. Such a person had to know Jesus from the beginning of his public ministry and have seen him after his resurrection. After much prayer among the community the lot falls to Matthias. In the Gospel, John 15:9-17, Jesus is giving special encouragement to his faithful followers. The primary commandment is to love one another. In that way they will remain in both his and the Father's love. He then tells them that they are not servants but friends - friends for whom he would lay down his life. They were chosen by him to go out and continue his work. The word 'Apostle' means 'messenger' and today – and on any feast of any Apostle – we are reminded that it is us who have heard the Gospel who are now called to take up the mantle of the Apostles and pass on the message of Jesus' Good News to the world.

Dear Jesus Christ, please help me to be your true Apostle on earth, and help me to effectively preach your gospel to other people. Do not let me be an obstacle to gospel evangelization, but help me to support it to spread further. I also pray for your ministers that spread your gospel throughout the world, please anoint and empower them unto success. Give them grace to irresistibly share your good news and lead people to your kingdom through them. Let every opposing force towards your gospel perish. Through the same Christ Our Lord. Amen.

Little is known about the life of St. Matthias, though tradition tells us that he went on to spread the Gospel message in North Africa. While preaching the Gospel message, Matthias emphasized the importance of self-control. In order to experience the peace and joy that God intends, Matthias said,

people must subordinate their physical desires to their spiritual desires. The physical body is only temporary and subject to many temptations to sin and illnesses, while the spiritual soul is permanent and able to discipline the body for good purposes. Matthias preached that the Holy Spirit will empower people to exercise self-control over their unhealthy physical desires so they can experience good health in both body and soul. For this reason St Matthias is Patron Saint for anyone suffering from an addiction, and those who care for them. So for our hymn today let us sing 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind' (one of my favourite hymns) and ask the Lord to 'breath through the heat of our desires coolness and balm,' https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=faNij71hh70

Let's pray for all the bereaved at this time, and let's not forget to clap for 'those in blue' tonight at eight.

Please pray for the repose of the soul of our dear friend Alan Bird, whose funeral service I will be celebrating at Fleetwood Cemetery at 11:30am this morning. *May he rest in the peace and love of Christ.* Please keep Christine and all Alan's family in your special prayers at this time.
