#### 1. **Aims**

Schools are required under the Equality Act 2010 to have an accessibility plan. The purpose of the plan is to:-

- Increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the curriculum
- Improve the physical environment of the school to enable disabled pupils to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided
- Improve the availability of accessible information to disabled pupils

The plan will be made available online on the school website, and paper copies are available upon request.

Our school is also committed to ensuring staff are trained in equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010, including understanding disability issues.

The school supports any available partnerships to develop and implement the plan.

Our school's complaints procedure covers the accessibility plan. If you have any concerns relating to accessibility in school, this procedure sets out the process for raising these concerns.

We have included a range of stakeholders in the development of this accessibility plan, including staff and governors of the school.

### 2. Legislation and guidance

This document meets the requirements of schedule 10 of the Equality Act 2010 and the Department for Education (DfE) guidance for schools on the Equality Act 2010.

The Equality Act 2010 defines an individual as disabled if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a 'substantial' and 'long-term' adverse effect on his or her ability to undertake normal day to day activities.

Under the Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) Code of Practice, 'long-term' is defined as 'a year or more' and 'substantial' is defined as 'more than minor or trivial'. The definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy and cancer.

Schools are required to make 'reasonable adjustments' for pupils with disabilities under the Equality Act 2010, to alleviate any substantial disadvantage that a disabled pupil faces in comparison with non-disabled pupils. This can include, for example, the provision of an auxiliary aid or adjustments to premises.

## 3. Action plan

This action plan sets out the aims of our accessibility plan in accordance with the Equality Act 2010.

Increase access to the curriculum for pupils with a disability	Our school offers a specialized Transition unit which supports the more complex needs pupils in their transition from primary to high school. The provision allows pupils additional time to get used to the working independence required within a mainstream secondary, without impacting negatively on their academic performance.  School expects all teachers to practice Quality First Teaching, meaning that all pupils within their class can access the lesson commensurate to their abilities.  Classroom practices are adapted for those with disabilities to ensure that access is never a barrier towards education (e.g. downstairs computer suite).  Targets are set for pupils in consultation with their IEPs, which are shared electronically via Arbor for all teaching staff to utilize during their planning.  HoDs regularly review the schemes of work to ensure that pupils' needs are met by the challenge of the work set.
