English

The English department have had a busy autumn term. Not only have students been learning vital communication skills and improving their reading and writing in class, but our KS 4 students are also well on the way to being prepared for their GCSEs in English Language and English Literature. By the Christmas holidays, both Year 10 and Year 11 students will have sat at least one mock exam, and hopefully our students will have been employed at home revising and getting themselves prepared. Our Year 11 students have been especially grateful for the innovative 'Talking Hands' video clips, created by the English teachers to assist students with their poetry revision. These twenty-minute clips have been trending on SEA TV in the run up to the Year 11 mock literature exam and will also prove useful when preparing for the actual GCSE exams next summer.

The English experience at Eddies is not all about hard work and exams, and this term has seen a full range of extra-curricular opportunities being embraced by our students. In September, a coachload of Year 11s enjoyed a performance of 'Macbeth' at The Lowry and two coachloads of Year 10s went to see 'Blood Brothers'. Year 8 enjoyed the Spelling Bee competition, leading to the final watched by the whole year group in October, and the Cake and Classics group spent a lovely hour with Mrs Baylis and Mrs Scott discussing the children's classic 'Little Women.' Mrs Graham and Mrs McLoughlin report that the recent launch of this year's BBC School Report went extremely well. This year's budding journalists are full of wonderful ideas for news stories and, fingerscrossed, the school might get involved with an actual BBC report for the fourth year running. Mrs Taylor has selected her Stan Lee team and their meetings are going well.

Looking ahead, our Better Reading Partnership scheme is about to start, we will organise another Spelling bee in the new year, Mrs Taylor has got plans in place for a book fair in the spring and the next Cake and Classics reading book is Hinton's 'The Outsiders' - a
