














SPOTLIGHT ON ENGLISH

Our Year 11s should now be revising and preparing for their GCSE exams which begin in May.

Firstly, the hard work from our BBC Young Reporters team culminated on Wednesday 6th March, when our dedicated reporters joined schools nationally in their news day. Year 7 have been exploring the parables of Jesus and the seven sacraments for the last term. On World Book Day, classes made a mini book about where the origins of the sacraments can be found in the Bible.

Year 8 have produced some excellent presentations about Christian denominations, and some classes had the opportunity to work with Maria our chaplain on Ecumenism, producing bookmarks to be distributed to local parishes. Pupils are now coming to the end of their work on Lent and Easter, studying what happened to Jesus during Holy Week and all classes will have the opportunity to participate in the Stations of the Cross.

Year 9 have studied Islam as their world religion this term, and have explored the Five Pillars in depth. They have also shown great maturity in studying sex and relationships this half term.

Year 10 have been studying Judaism as their world religion element of their GCSE course. Some classes have tried out new revision methods, such as a revision clock – in one hour, they had only five minutes to summarise each of the twelve topics. These are a good foundation for future revision of this topic.














Year 7

Year 7 have been working hard in their lessons and have managed to rack up a total of 8,494 achievement points since January for their efforts. Each form is striving to get onto the leader board in their awards assembly at the end of the term. Currently 7M are taking the lead with a total of 1,113 achievement points since January.

A total of £361 has been raised so far this year for our charity, Wigan & Leigh Hospice. Our Year 7 forms have worked very hard to give up their time to fundraise for such a worthwhile charity, from countless cake sales and sponsored silences, to creating their own lunchtime pantomime performance. Our Year 7 pupils are very conscientious and charitable students and will continue to raise money until the end of the school year.

At Christmas, we had over 50 students 'Beat their Best' and earn an invite to our Christmas party. Our Beat your Best initiative has now gone live on the portal. Pupils must ensure they add their extra-curricular activities for their teachers to sign them off in time for our Easter reward. We are looking forward to celebrating all of their good behaviour in our assembly.

The overarching aim for Year 8 is Broadening Horizons. Many of our students take part in wider aspects of school life. Our bespoke programmes have continued and we currently have a new group of boys taking part in our second Wigan Athletic Enterprise Programme.

The 'Fashion Show' girls are making great progress; thank-you to Wigan and Leigh College. We have had teachers and students from the college deliver sessions on Hair, Beauty and Photography. The girls were also recently invited to attend catering and fashion show sessions at the college.

Twelve Year 8 girls attended the 'Digital Her Roadshow in Wigan' The Digital Her Roadshows are designed to inspire and empower girls across the Greater Manchester region to take up careers in digital and technology fields. The day comprises of talks, workshops and activities for the girls and workshops for the teachers to help them understand the careers that are available in industry, plus resources available for them to use in school.

Year 8 continue to work on their mental well-being. We are taking part in our whole-school initiative 'Mind Body and Soul'. During form time, we have explored the importance of looking after our mental well-being. We are now on our third strand, 'Give'. We have ten well-being reps, two from each of our forms, who all took part in relevant training.

Two of of Year 8 students, (Lily Wyatt and Robert Morris) took part in the UK Maths Challenge. They came second overall and may get the chance to go to London. Watch this space!

As a year group, we are on 96% attendance which is great, but there is still room for improvement. Lates are creeping up recently and pupils need to ensure they make a real effort to be punctual to avoid detentions.

Total achievement points this year amount to 22066 which vastly overshadow the 3745 behaviour points.

Personal Development Curriculum

We visited Skills North West in March at Event City in Manchester. A group of Year 10 pupils were given an opportunity to speak to employers, training providers, colleges, universities and professional bodies face-to-face. This event was chosen to raise aspirations, motivate and inspire through hands-on demonstrations and activities across a wide variety of stands and exhibitions.

As part of our careers curriculum, Y10 pupils who have expressed an interest in studying Business Studies in the future were selected to participate in the St John Rigby College Business Challenge 2019. The event is a competition amongst local high schools with students working as a team on a business challenge and presenting their findings to a panel of judges. They worked on problem solving, organisation, prioritising and presentation skills. We are delighted to report they were runners-up in the competition; the judges made special mention of their excellent commitment, teamwork and communication.

The Year 10 Workplace Challenge - pupils have been set the challenge to investigate a workplace to increase their knowledge of the many different environments that it is possible to work in. We are looking forward to learning all about their experiences.

A group of Y10 boys visited Lancaster University with Greater Manchester Higher, a network partnership which is part of the National Collaborative Outreach Programme. The boys had a campus tour and university-style lectures; to discover what it is like to study at university, moving onwards to university, plus a resilience and mindset workshop.

Around 700 pupils in Years 7 – 9 have been undertaking everyday First aid and CPR lifesaving skills provided and funded by The British Red Cross.

Crime' day in March: pupils the opportunity to develop an insight into crime, its consequences and prison life. CELLS (Choices Education Lifelong Learning Skills) are a specialist team of rehabilitated ex-offenders, abuse/violence victims and people who work alongside victims of crime, all giving a realistic insight into crime and have received specific training for the presentation and delivery of the day. Having all undergone enhanced DBS checks, the aim of CELLS is to deter children from embracing crime and it is for this reason that they will be shown hard-hitting images and real life portrayals of the consequences of crime in order to promote positive lifestyles.
