#### **Year Three & Four**


In maths, we have begun our new unit on addition and subtraction. The children have been consolidating their knowledge of number bonds to 10, 20, 50 and 100, and using this understanding to develop mental strategies for adding across a boundary — something we found a little tricky at first but are improving with practice.

In English, our focus has turned to Loch Ness from a narrative point of view as we work towards creating our own imaginative stories. We began by exploring some poems and learning one by heart — a great way to strengthen our memory muscles!

In history, we have been fascinated by the construction of the Great Pyramid of Giza, gaining a good understanding of the role of slaves, the challenging conditions they faced in the heat, and the incredible scale of their achievement. In music, we are learning to sing Mamma Mia by ABBA and play parts of it on our recorder which everyone is enjoying.

This week, we have also been discussing what it means to work as a team. We were inspired by the seasonal sight of geese migrating and learned how they support one another — taking turns to lead, 'honking' encouragement, and even staying behind if a member of their flock becomes tired or injured. Just like the geese, we have all been working hard to 'fly in a V' together — supporting each other, listening to each other and encouraging each other.

A great life lesson, we are all taking onboard- well done Year 3 & 4.












#### Dear Parents and Carers

#### **Classroom News!**

**EYFS** 

This week, in FSU we learnt about Mary Seacole as part of Black History week and we thought about why she is a significant person in black history and how she helped people as nurse. This week in our Home Sweet Home topic, we have explored the different materials that houses can be built from and identified the materials our own homes are made from. In maths, Reception have been looking at the numbers 1,2 and 3, and we learnt how to subitise and represent the amounts. Nursery have continued to look at identifying colours, creating simple repeated patterns and sorting objects by colour. In Literacy, we started to look at a new book, and we have been looking at family members and identifying who is our family. We have also looked at a poem 'Our Family' by Sue Townsend and we have practised performing the poem using a story map and actions. In phonics, Reception have worked hard this week to learn the new sounds h,b,f,l and the children have begun to apply their phonics knowledge to read and write some simple CVC words. Well done FSU!

Year One & Two

Another fabulous week in year 1 / 2. We've had lots of fun and laughter while working hard. In English this week, we have started reading non-fiction books about wolves and learning lots of interesting facts. I hope the children have been coming home and sharing all the new vocabulary they have learned, such as pack,protect, and alpha!

In History, we have begun to look at Learie Constantine's early life in Trinidad and Tobago and his early cricket career. We have started to understand the racial discrimination he faced and how he overcame challenges throughout his life.

In Science, we have continued to explore materials. This week, we investigated how an object can change shape by twisting, squashing, and bending.

In Maths, we have been using lots of equipment on the carpet in groups to learn our number bonds to 10. Well done, Year 1 and 2 another brilliant week of learning! You should all be super proud of yourselves!

Year Five & Six

This week Year 5/6 have been developing their vocabulary and writing choices. The children have been developing descriptive paragraphs about the content of a magical room and using noun phrases to build a very good visual image of the content of the room. In History, the children explored life in Baghad and London in 600AD. Here, the children were able to compare the two differing livestyles and highlight a range of issues between the two. The children identified how nearly a million people lived in Baghad during this time frame compare to the 20,000 in London - how times have changed.

Our RE topic of loving has now been completed and the children finished the unit by composing their own acrostic poem all about loving our families, friends and God. Our mathematics skills have been challenged a lot this week also. Firstly, we had children visit the high school for a local school math challenge and they did extremely well. Secondly, we have been investigating using the inverse in maths this week and we have tried to solve quiet a few challenge math problems.
