### Year Five & Six

Year 5/6 have enjoyed a week of 'normality' this week and have been investigating lots of different things. In Science, we are developing are understanding of the animal kingdom and categorising all the animals in the world into groups. We also had a visit from Ms Cassidy, who is helping us with our personal, social and emotion skills.

In English, we have planned and are ready to write our exciting modern version of Macbeth. The children have come up with some hilarious ideas, changing horses to electric scooters . In Mathematics, the children have been solidifying their understanding of fractions, decimals and percentages and how they are linked together.

Finally, our topic of DT (protein bars) is also coming to an end, as the children are currently writing a set of instructions and they will finally make and package their product next week. In PE, the children have been working on their team building skills.

- Year EYFS This week in EYFS we have been looking at the book The Rainbow Fish and talking about what makes a good friend. Then in our continuous provision we have been practicing how to be a good friend by sharing and using our marvelous manners. In Maths this week children have been practicing subitising and sorting items into groups.
- Year One & Two Year 1&2 have had a fantastic week! We have been writing more instructions, thinking about how we get ready for school and in what order we do each part of our routine. In Maths, we have continued our learning about fractions. We have looked at halves, quarters, thirds and unit fractions. The children have grown in confidence during the week and are now really good at recognising them. We started our new art topic on sculptures and the children have enjoyed looking at Antony Gormley's 'Another Place'. In RE, we have been learning about the Pentecost and in PE we have been developing our throwing skills. Well done Year 1&2!
- Year Three & Four This week in Year 3/4, we've completed our DT project on Vivienne Westwood. The children have explored a brief; researched her existing products; designed a variety of different bags that would meet their design criteria; created and then evaluated their own bags. The children have all worked hard during this unit and I'm sure you'll agree the outcomes have been brilliant. ## The law on leaving your child on their own

The law does not say an age when you can leave a child on their own, but it's an offence to leave a child alone if it places them at risk.

Use your judgement on how mature your child is before you decide to leave them alone, for example at home or in a car.

The National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NSPCC) says:

- children under 12 are rarely mature enough to be left alone for a long period of time
- children under 16 should not be left alone overnight
- babies, toddlers and very young children should never be left alone

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Parents can be prosecuted if they leave a child unsupervised 'in a manner likely to cause unnecessary suffering or injury to health'.

School will be closing at the normal time on Friday 26th May 2023. On Monday, in assembly we will be announcing those children who have been chosen by the teachers for the end of half term MacDonald's treat. So look out to see if it is your child. The children who are being considered are those who go above and beyond to do the right thing all of the time.
