This Weeks Spotlight! Year Three & Four

I am thrilled with the effort from Year 3 & 4 this week. In English, we created a diary for a character from The Iron Man, focusing on thoughts and feelings plus adverbs and adverbials. It was a lot to think about but the children managed to produce some lovely diary entries independently. In maths, we continue to make connections and this week we noticed how the 6 times table is the 3 times table doubled and the 9 times table is the 3 times table tripled! The Going for Gold display is up on the wall with 36 key multiplications to help us master our tables - each week we focus on 2 facts.

In geography, the atlases came out and we identified different countries within Europe and in French we have been using expressions to convey how we feel. In PE, the coach has been showing us different travels, balances and jumps and we have been working our core muscles to be strong and controlled. Above all, reading has been fantastic this week. So many more students using Reading Plus and Collins Hub regularly and children coming in excited to tell me about the book they have finished or how they have levelled-up on Reading Plus. Well done, you have absolutely earned the Friday afternoon hot chocolate and movie.

EYFS

This week in EYFS we have been exploring Lunar New Year. The children enjoyed learning about where it is celebrated and how it is celebrated. We listened to the story of the Great Race which is the tale behind the animals of the zodiac, and we looked at which animal wad our year. Also, we tasted Asian food which was really tasty and had a Lunar New Year celebration on Friday using the decorations we made. In Literacy this week we have continued to look at our non-fiction book about penguins and as a class wrote fact about penguins to create our own fact files. In Maths, Reception have started their new topic of 6,7 and 8. This week they have worked on what they look like and how they are made. In Nursery, the children have continued to look at the number 4, what it looks like and how it is made.

Year One & Two

Year 1&2 have had a lovely week. We have been busy learning more about the properties of 2D and 3D shapes in maths and recognising patterns. In English, we have been planning our own independent version of our 'Zog' stories and writing some 'monster' acrostic poems. In RE, we have started to explore our new topic. Thinking about the importance of special meals that we share with our family and friends. In geography, we have been learning the names of the five oceans and in science we have been looking at the season of Autumn. What the weather is like and what special events occur. Well done Year 1&2 for another great week!

Year Five & Six

Year 5/6 have an extraordinarily busy week this week. Many of the Year 5 children have passed level 1 or Level 2 of the bicycle and road safety course. The tutors commented on their exceptional behaviour and their abilities - well done year 5. All the children have been also to forest school, where the made pancakes, completed artwork and climbed the trees - a lot of fun was had - some more than others (the boys covered in mud 2).

In English, the children have been developing their written work this week, as they have been focusing on noun phrases and how to use them for extra detail in their writing. We have also been getting ready for the swimming gala next week. The children have been working hard to swim at their fastest speeds and work as a team during the relay. Fingers crossed for Tuesday evening for those children that have been selected.

In Geography, the children have been using atlas to locate the climate zones around the world and they have discussed why specific climate zones are different due to the weather.

Advice from NHS Direct concerning Chickenpox

Do

- drink plenty of fluid (try ice lollies if your child is not drinking) to avoid dehydration
- ✓ take <u>paracetamol</u> to help with pain and discomfort
- cut your child's fingernails and put socks on their hands at night to stop them scratching
- use cooling creams or gels from a pharmacy
- ✓ speak to a pharmacist about using <u>antihistamine medicine</u> to help itching
- ✓ bathe in cool water and pat the skin dry (do not rub)
- ✓ dress in loose clothes

Don't

- ★ do not use <u>ibuprofen</u> unless advised to do so by a doctor, as it may cause serious skin infections
- X do not give aspirin to children under 16
- X do not go near newborn babies, or anyone who is pregnant or has a weakened immune system, as chickenpox can be dangerous for them
- X do not scratch the spots, as scratching can cause scarring

Speak to a GP if:

- you're not sure it's chickenpox
- · you're concerned about your child

Tell the receptionist you think it might be chickenpox before going in to a GP surgery.

Get advice from 111 now if:

- the skin around the chickenpox blisters is hot, painful and red, but redness may be harder to see on brown or black skin
- your child has chickenpox and is dehydrated
- chickenpox symptoms suddenly get worse
- you're pregnant and have not had chickenpox before, or you're not sure, and you've been near someone with chickenpox
- you have a weakened immune system and have been near someone with chickenpox
- you think your newborn baby has chickenpox

Some people may be able to take medicine to prevent complications. It needs to be started within 24 hours of the spots appearing.
