The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about their home city Manchester and its fascinating history, art and culture.

Manchester is a major city in the northwest of England with a rich industrial heritage. The Castlefield conservation area's 18th-century canal system recalls the city's days as a textile powerhouse, and visitors can trace this history at the interactive Museum of Science & Industry. The revitalised Salford Quays dockyards now house the Daniel Libeskind-designed Imperial War Museum North and the Lowry cultural centre.

You might want to paint or draw your own Lowry style artwork? If you have some chalks why not create some matchstick men, cats and dogs outside?

The artwork and illustrations in the Leather Shoe Charlie story are beautiful but in a sad setting, compare the story illustrations to the paintings of LS Lowry, which do you prefer and why?

If you do go to the Lowry Centre in Salford make sure you see the Lowry paintings – my favourite one is called The Fight – I wonder which one you will like the best?

Have a walk around Manchester and see how many bees you can spot – the worker bee is an important symbol of Manchester's industrial heritage.

Manchester places of interest – These are some of my favourite places to visit in the Manchester area – please check if you need to book in advance. Most of these places are free to get in too.

1. MOSI – The Museum of Science and Industry- tons to see here include the history of textiles and weaving which link to the story of Leather Shoe Charlie. There is also the fantastic aerospace and steam shed full of the history of aeroplanes, steam trains, there's also the first computer ever built on display – well worth checking out.
2. The Lowry Centre in Salford Quays – visit the gallery to see the Lowry paintings and there's usually other exhibitions on too – don't forget to admire the architecture! Media City has lots of green space for a picnic and there's shops and restaurant to visit as well.
3. Imperial War Museum North – another fantastic museum is just across the bridge from the Lowry and is packed full of fabulous war machines and artefacts linked to local war veterans.
4. Central Library is a fascinating building just off St Peters Square – look at the architecture and don't forget to look up at the dome. Last time I visited they'd installed film pods and interactive history archives .
5. The John Rylands Library on Deansgate is also a beautiful building, the main library reminds me of the Harry Potter films and the public toilets are like stepping back in time to the Victorian era.
6. Manchester Town Hall is a fascinating building and gets used a lot in period drama films. High Victorian architecture check out the mosaic floors, vaulted ceilings, stained glass windows and magnificent staircases – they used to do a fantastic Manchester themed afternoon tea here but you'd need to check if the café is open beforehand
7. Manchester Art Gallery on Mosley Street always has great exhibitions and has a great child friendly interactive section – if it's open! Lovely café for tea and cake if you fancy it.
8. The Peoples History Museum is all about the cities social history which fascinates me but might not be everyone's cup of tea so check out their website first.
9. Salford Museum and Art Gallery and Lark Hill Place – just off Salford Crescent by the University. Lark Hill place is fantastic; it is a Victorian Street packed with memorabilia from a bygone era, there's even a pub and cobbled streets.
10. Quarry Bank Mill Styal is a great day out and again links with the story of Leather Shoe Charlie but this time the setting is rural not the industrial heart of the city of Manchester- great river walk too!
