Dear Parents and carers

We are really enjoying the better summer weather and the opportunities it provides for us to take classes offsite and outdoors. The pandemic though is, unfortunately, not over and we continue to need to follow all the restrictions set out in the government's guidance. The children and young people in the school are coping extremely well with all these changes we needed to make. I want to thank you for all the support you are giving to us as we move towards the end of the academic year. I know it has been another difficult school year for you as your child's education has been so disrupted. We are looking forward now to the slow careful resumption of normal schooling.

We have begun planning for a wider range of summer events involving transition days, sports days and celebration assemblies. We are doing this in the hope that the government's roadmap out of the pandemic restrictions will proceed as they have outlined. The recent rise in the Delta variant of the Covid -19 virus in the Canterbury area has led us to be more cautious though. This means that the first transition day we scheduled will be cancelled. Therefore at the moment we are looking towards events happening in July and towards the end of the term but this remains subject to the latest government advice and guidance.

We are now into the new financial year and have been able to finalise last year's accounts. We ended the last financial year with a large underspend of £800,000. This was on a total budget spend of nearly six and a half million pounds. The underspend was high because a lot of the normal spending of the school had to stop because of the epidemic. We also received additional funding for more pupils but were not able to employ the additional staff until this financial year. The school also needs to have an underspend because at the moment it operates with an in-year deficit budget. This means that within the financial year we spend more than we receive back in funds from the local authority. The governors are working closely with me to ensure over the next three years that this is not the case and the school is financially sound going into the future. A lot of this underspend has been allocated to additional staffing, learning resources and building works over the next year.
