COLLECTIVE WORSHIP POLICY

INTRODUCTION

This policy makes reference to the following documents:

THE LEGAL FRAMEWORK - a background

The Education Reform Act 1988 requires that all pupils registered in maintain schools, attend a daily act of collective worship. This requirement is restated in the recent document, The National Curriculum in England: New Framework, effective from September 2014. It is the responsibility of the Headteacher, after consultation with the Governing Body, to arrange for daily acts of worship to take place. This requirement applies to Special Schools as far as is practicable. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from the act of collective worship.

The (revised) Kent Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education 2012, "A Creative Vision for Religious Education" (largely based on same for 2006) provides a basis for planning collective worship and follows the recommendations contained in the national documents listed above, including DfES Non-Statutory National Framework for Religious Education (Oct, 2004), "Guidance in Religious Education and Collective Worship". The Kent Agreed Syllabus 2012 helps schools "promote pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development through religious communication".

The content and themes of acts of collective worship are planned to be accessible and intelligible to our pupils and have regard to their social, cultural, religious and non-religious backgrounds as well as their ages and aptitudes.

The principles behind our school worship are:-

- Worship should be inclusive
- Worship should be curricular
- Worship should be educational
- Worship should contribute to spiritual development
- Worship should have a sense of occasion
- Worship should be shaped to the needs of our school and our pupils

The features of our school worship are:-

- Sense of awe
- Sense of wonder
- Sense of change
- Sense of pattern and purpose
- Awareness of the natural world
- Awareness of personal worth
- Awareness of others
- Awareness of community
- Awareness of achievement
- Awareness of loss, suffering and sadness
- Awareness that life involves choices

Collective worship is organised at a whole school level, a department level and a class level following the Kent Sacre guidance document 2012 'Gathering Together: Policy and Practice for Collective Worship'.

In the Primary Department, Collective Worship follows a termly cycle of six themes:

- Celebration
- Relationships
- Communication
- Specialness
- Community
- Values

Incorporated in this is the celebration of festivals and special events in the major religions and cultures (See Appendix A).

In the Senior Department and FE (Post 16), Collective Worship is based on the festivals calendar and will be developed with the introduction of an appropriate Collective Worship Syllabus.
