When adding **-est** to words ending in **y** and with a consonant before it, replace the **y** with an **i**.

happiest  
funniest

## Grammar

This week, we have been learning about adjectives and expanded noun phrases.



- **Adjectives** are words to describe the nouns in the sentence.
- Expanded noun phrases can be made by adding an **adjective** to a noun phrase.

the **happy** girl

my **cuddly** teddy

- You can also expand a noun phrase by adding information about **where** or **when** something is happening.

The boy **on the stage** was drumming.
