


Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?		16 children could swim the length of the pool. Eight of the 26 children that attended lessons in Year Five were provided with the opportunity to attend lessons again in Year Six. Seven non-swimmers attended weekly lessons with a teacher: child ratio of 2:7.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	27%
