Topic Background

A huge variety of music exists in Africa from classical to pop music, and the roots of all of our music is believed to have sprung from traditional African music. Unlike our own traditional music, traditional African music is celebrated widely.

Rhythm forms the foundations of African music. All movement creates rhythm and every aspect of life is therefore accompanied by music; from the gathering of crops, the pounding of flour, to the working of metals in the blacksmiths and the washing of clothes in the river. Music is an essential part of celebrations including weddings and funerals. Music also socially binds a village through dancing and the famous art of storytelling by the village Griot. Griots are travelling poets, musicians, and storytellers who still maintain a tradition of aural history in parts of West Africa.

Repetition of a musical pattern or rhythm.




polyrhythm

Key Vocabulary

call and response: two phrases, the first phrase being the call and the second phrase is a response to the first

dynamics: how loud or quiet a sound is

improvise: creating music on the spot

melody: the tune of the music made up of high and low pitches **mnemonics**: the use of words to help remember and create rhythms

ostinato: repetition of a musical pattern or rhythm

performance: an act of performing a song or piece of music

polyrhythm: two or more rhythms played at the same time pulse: the heartbeat of the music

rhythm: patterns of sound consisting of shorter and longer notes

structure: how a piece is organised

texture: combining different layers of music to give an overall effect
