- To be a prime minister, you need to be able to win over the people. Write a speech or design a manifesto explaining what you would do if you ran the country and why people should vote for you!
- Create your own political party - decide on your name, logo and policies
- Write a formal letter to your local MP or the Houses of Parliament about an issue that is important to you.
- Draw/paint a picture of the Houses of Parliament and Big Ben.
- Create a 3D model of the Houses of Parliament and Big Ben.
- Create portraits of famous British prime ministers

Explore your mathematical skills

- Research the last General election - how many people voted? How old were they? How many votes did each party get? Present your findings using bar charts, pie charts and line graphs.
- Create a time line showing when each prime minister came to power, what political party they represented and how long they were in power

- Research the history of democracy - where it started and how it's evolved over time
- Research the suffragette movement and how they made a lasting impact on the rights of women.
