

Project Week – This week’s work will all be based on an animal of your choice. We have set this project up so that adults can work with multiple children on the same theme therefore hopefully making it easier for families with siblings in primary school.

Job 1: Select an animal of your choice. 2. Have a look at the activities below and choose which one you would like to start with. 3. Take a picture and keep it to upload to Seesaw. 4. Upload it to Seesaw for staff to look at, but remember, they won’t look at Seesaw until 27th April because they are having their Easter break with their own children, and working in school to keep the children of key workers safe and happy.

Create a fact file all about your animal.	Write or record a story where your animal features as the main character. Try to make sure you have a beginning, middle and end. Your story might have a moral message too. You could turn it into a book and draw pictures too accompany it too.	Draw a picture of your animal. Take time to make sure you draw your picture carefully. You could use paints, felt tips, pencil crayons, pastels – anything you have in your house.	Make a model of your animal. Maybe you could use Lego. You might make it out of things from the recycling box. It’s your choice.
Make a board game which features your animal.	Make an animal word search or learn to spell some animal names.	Make a habitat for your animal. Think about the things it needs.	Write or voice record a set of questions you would ask you animal if it could talk.
Write or draw a list of ingredients for a soup that your animal might enjoy.	Write a poem about your animal.	Make an animal mask.	Make up a song or a rap about your animal.
Find an animal that is bigger and an animal that is smaller than your animal.	Play guess my animal about your animal and others. Do actions or give clues to help someone guess what you are.	Draw your animal and label its body parts.	Make an animal footprint out of cardboard. Go outside and see if you can make a trail with it using mud prints. Or make the footprint out of playdough.

See if you can move like your animal.	Make a video documentary all about your animal.	Design a zoo for your animal and other animals. Draw a zoo map	Hold an animal Olympics in the garden with your family.
