MFL INTENT STATEMENT

At the Blessed Sacrament Catholic Primary School, we want to enable the children to foster a love of languages and develop independent language learning skills. The core language taught will be Spanish. Our planning is based on National Curriculum content using the Ensemble Project and our own topic web. It will help prepare our children to be global citizens who have a tolerance and respect for other and people from other backgrounds and cultures.

TEACHING AND LEARNING IN MFL

Teaching should focus on enabling pupils to make substantial progress in one language. At The Blessed Sacrament Catholic Primary School, we will teach Spanish to Key Stage 2 pupils, using the expertise of an internal specialist. It should provide an appropriate balance of spoken and written language and should lay the foundations for further language teaching at key stage 3. It should enable pupils to understand and communicate ideas, facts and feelings in speech and writing, focused on familiar and routine matters, using their knowledge of phonology, grammatical structures and vocabulary.

Teaching and learning should be:

- Exciting and challenging
- Planned in accordance with the KS2 Framework for languages
- Have high expectations for all pupils
- Linked to key skills
- Provide regular opportunities for pupils to demonstrate, practice and apply their skills
- Based in a stimulating and creative environment
- Linked to the world in which our pupils live

MFL IN KEY STAGE TWO

MFL is taught for 3 half terms per academic year in each year group. The focus of study in modern languages will be on practical communication.

Pupils should be taught to:

- listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
- explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words
- engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help

- speak in sentences, using familiar vocabulary, phrases and basic language structures
- develop accurate pronunciation and intonation so that others understand when they are reading aloud or using familiar words and phrases
- present ideas and information orally to a range of audiences
- read carefully and show understanding of words, phrases and simple writing
- appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language
- broaden their vocabulary and develop their ability to understand new words that are introduced into familiar written material, including through using a dictionary
- write phrases from memory and adapt these to create new sentences, to express ideas clearly
- describe people, places, things and actions orally and in writing
- understand basic grammar appropriate to the language being studied, including feminine, masculine and neuter forms and the conjugation of high-frequency verbs; key features and patterns of the language; how to apply these, for instance, to build sentences; and how these differ from or are similar to English.

PLANNING FOR MFL

Planning follows the set format for foundation subjects in school. Topics are covered as detailed in the unit overview for the school. Wherever possible, the units will link to the curriculum approach that we use in school. There is also a progression in vocabulary document that is used to support the learning in each class.

ASSESSMENT IN MFL

Assessment in MFL will include a range of assessment for learning strategies to enable the teacher to accurately access the knowledge of the children in Spanish.

Each half term, the teacher will complete the relevant assessment sheet for the year group, highlighting off the learning that the children have covered and indicating the children who are below, at and exceeding age-related expectations.

RESOURCES

Each class will have a vocabulary list and display relevant to their current unit of work. Guidance for resources will be taken from the Ensemble languages project.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING

Advice for MFL is taken from the ensemble languages project.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

MFL falls under the remit of the English Faculty Lead.

The internal specialist is responsible for planning and delivering lessons in PPA time, in consultation with the class teacher and enhancing curriculum links where possible.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

Monitoring and evaluation of MFL is an going cycle to ensure that practices are reviewed and that we are aiming for best practice in our school.

These processes include:

- monitoring and reviewing the curriculum overview for MFL, making changes where necessary
- discussions with the internal specialist and pupils about their experiences, attitudes, achievements and progression
- monitoring and reviewing assessment, looking at pupil progress with a view to enhancing standards within the subject area
- ensuring that assessment is accurate and a true reflection of the children's abilities within our school

INCLUSION

All children in KS2 should have the opportunity to develop and learn a new language.

Children who are below age-related expectations should have support to encourage and foster a love of languages.

Children who above age-related expectations should have the opportunity to demonstrate their understanding and lead the learning for other children where appropriate.
