

PSHE

Intent

Personal, Social and Health Education is a vital jigsaw piece of the curriculum at The Blessed Sacrament Catholic Primary School. It is part of the faculty of Spiritual, Moral, Social and Emotional Development with cross-curricular links with RE and HRSE. Our aim is to support children in facing challenges and barriers they may face as well as help them become well-rounded individuals who can contribute positively to society. We want our children to experience a wide, rich and inclusive education that supports them as they grow, change and develop as individuals.

Implementation

Our PSHE curriculum is a progressive curriculum which is designed to deepen and build on the previous years of learning. Its primary purpose is to help our children to respect the beliefs, values and attributes of others and develop their sense of personal identity. Our teachers have access to the PSHE Association resources to support and guide their planning. PSHE is taught as both a discrete subject and in a cross-curricular way when appropriate. PSHE subject leader monitors the resources required to deliver the curriculum on a regular basis.

Impact

Assessment is an integral part of the teaching process at The Blessed Sacrament Catholic Primary School. Assessment is used to inform planning and to facilitate differentiation. The assessment of children's work is on-going to ensure that understanding is being achieved and that progress is being made. Entries are made in the class floorbook during the course of a topic. The PSHE subject leader collects a portfolio of evidence for reference and moderation throughout the year including pupil voices. Summative judgements are made in relation to year group expectations on a termly basis which are then analysed by the PSHE subject leader.


