First reading:

'Against those who 'buy the poor for silver.'

Hear this, you who trample on the needy and bring the poor of the land to an end, saying, 'When will the new moon be over, that we may sell grain? And the Sabbath, that we may offer wheat for sale, that we may make the ephah small and the shekel great and deal deceitfully with false balances, that we may buy the poor for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and sell the chaff of the wheat?' The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: 'Surely I will never forget any of their deeds.'

Response: Praise the Lord, who raises the poor.

1 Timothy 2:1-8 **Second Reading:**

'Prayers should be made for all people to God, who desires all people to be saved.'

Beloved: First of all, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Saviour, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time.

For this I was appointed a preacher and an Apostle — I am telling the truth, I am not lying — a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth. I desire then that in every place the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarrelling.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia. Jesus Christ, though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich. Alleluia.

Gospel Reading: Luke 16:1-13

'You cannot serve God and money.'

At that time: Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was wasting his possessions. And he called him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Turn in the account of your management, for you can no longer be manager." And the manager said to himself, "What shall I do, since my master is taking the management away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do, so that when I am removed from management, people may receive me into their houses." So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he said to the first, "How much do you owe my master?" He said, "A hundred measures of oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty." Then he said to another, "And how much do you owe?" He said, "A hundred measures of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and write eighty." The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness. For the sons of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light.' And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings.

'One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. If then you have not been faithful with the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? No servant can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.'

REFLECTION

Our world is obsessed with money: it seems to be at the root of everything we do. It can make demands on our behaviour and prevents us from being the person that God created. When we have too much, we are bored and indulge in all sorts of foolish behaviour. When we do not have enough, we fight for more and, if we cannot earn more. we resort to borrowing what we cannot repay. Today's readings are a warning to us of the dangers and unfairness of our obsession with money and are a call to us to change our ways if we are to serve God through the way we live.

We create a world of inequality, of rich and poor. This was certainly true in the time of Amos, the prophet of social justice. Amos speaks for those who have no voice; he reveals to us the God who defends the rights of the poor. Those who "buy the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals" are living among us today. We need to revisit our option for the poor of this world and try again to change this world of haves and have nots. God calls to us in today's psalm not to forget the poor and makes this promise "He raises the poor to set them in the company of princes".

The passage from Paul's letter to Timothy reminds me of the bidding prayers at Sunday Mass. Paul advises that prayers be offered for everyone; he calls them "supplications, prayers, intercessions and thanksgivings, The Bidding Prayers were introduced to give the lay people a voice in the Mass yet how many of us listen, carefully and prayerfully. when they are spoken. We need to understand that the intercessions are a gift to us, and we need to use them wisely.

One of the problems with money is that it changes the way we are and effects the lives of those around us. The steward in today's gospel is called astute because he uses his power over his master's money to ensure that he does not become poor. He draws others into his actions by preying on their need for money. We can condemn his actions but also have a grudging respect for him for he has made his power over money serve him in this life. What is the effect of his actions on his eternal life? That is in God's hands.
