This Sundays Readings

27TH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

First reading: Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4

'The righteous shall live by his faith.'

O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not hear? Or cry to you 'Violence!' and you will not save? Why do you make me see iniquity, and why do you idly look at wrong? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise.

And the Lord answered me: 'Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so he may run who reads it. For still the vision awaits its appointed time; it hastens to the end — it will not lie. If it seems slow, wait for it; it will surely come; it will not

Luke 17:5-10 **Gospel Reading:**

'If you had faith.'

At that time: The Apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' And the Lord said, 'If you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

'Will any one of you who has a servant ploughing or keeping sheep say to him when he has come in from the field, "Come at once and recline at table"? Will he not rather say to him, "Prepare supper for me, and dress properly, and serve me while I eat and drink, and afterwards you will eat and drink"? Does he thank the servant because he did what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty." '

REFLECTION

There are times when the love of God seems to be far from our lives: times when the daily struggle overwhelms us and we cry out to God in anguish. Today's first reading from the prophet Habakkuk is a powerful reminder that this feeling of isolation is nothing new. He lived in a time of great despair in Judah; the nation was enslaved by the Babylonians and was without hope. The people had lost faith in God and only a remnant remained faithful and turned to God in their prayer for freedom. Habakkuk receives his answer through a vision, a promise: for redemption will come "if it seems slow, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not delay". So take heart. God will not fail us, He loves us in our faithfulness.

Paul's mission was to spread the news of salvation to all the world. He was a very astute man, he understood that faith does not come fully grown, that it must be nurtured. worked upon, for it to grow; and it is fragile like a hot house flower, susceptible to the cold reality of the world. He speaks to us today "I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God which is within you." Paul reminds us that this gift in not of timidity but of power and love and self- control. His audience would contain a great number of slaves to whom the concept of power would be far from their reality, and he urges them to "share in suffering for the Gospel by the power of God". This lesson is for us also in today's world; we may not be slaves in the sense of the first century, but we are enslaved by the pressures of modern life, and we need to be constantly vigilant in protecting the gift of faith given to us by Christ.

Jesus was a very patient man; his apostles always seem to struggle with his teaching, and he leads them slowly to understanding. They have listened to his criticism of the Pharisees, and they seek guidance from him about themselves. He reminds them that they should not act like masters but as servants, always considering others before themselves. We must always be careful that our faith does not become a symbol of superiority, but a sign of God's love and our duty is to spread that love through our families, friends. neighbours and into the world.


Kids Corner:

When we are baptized God gives us the gift of faith. Then it's up to us to use it. We use that gift when we decide to believe in God and what He tells us in the Church and the Bible.




