UPCOMING COLLECTIONS - Our next collection for the work of the SVP will be on 15th February.

First reading: Isaiah 58:6-10

‘Your light shall break forth like the dawn.’

Thus says the Lord: Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover him, and not to hide yourself from your own flesh? Then shall your light break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up speedily; your righteousness shall go before you; the glory of the Lord shall be your rearguard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry, and he will say, ‘Here I am.’ If you take away the yoke from your midst, the pointing of the finger, and speaking wickedness, if you pour yourself out for the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then shall your light rise in the darkness and your gloom be as the noonday.

Response: A light rises in the darkness for the upright.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

‘I proclaimed to you the mystery of Christ crucified.’

I, when I came to you, brothers and sisters, did not come proclaiming to you the testimony of God with lofty speech or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness and in fear and much trembling, and my speech and my message were not in plausible words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the power of God.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia.

I am the light of the world, says the Lord;
whoever follows me will have the light of life.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 5:13-16

‘You are the light of the world.’

At that time: Jesus said to his disciples, ‘You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people’s feet.

‘You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.’

REFLECTION

Lent is fast approaching, it is early this year, and our thoughts may be turning to how we are going to mark this Lenten season. When we were children, we were often told to give up something, usually something we liked. Times change and now the current idea is not to give up but to take up during Lent. Today’s first reading is very relevant to this idea especially when we look to help those less fortunate than ourselves.

Isaiah speaks of a vision that establishes a people who are aware of the world in which they live and how they can serve God through serving others. It is an extension of the thought behind the Beatitudes which we listened to in last week’s Gospel. It is a list of practical actions which will benefit those without wealth or power and leads us closer to our loving father. We have the Father’s promise “Then you shall call and the Lord will answer; you shall cry, and He will say, “Here I am”. Read this passage carefully for it can lead you to a new approach as to what you can do to help people during Lent and perhaps for the years to come.

Paul speaks to us of his fears as he journeyed among the nations and spoke of the crucified Christ. He did not come as a powerful orator but as one who wanted to share his faith and help people to change. His purpose was to bring us to faith through the Spirit and power “so that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the Power of God”

Salt was an important mineral in the ancient world when preserving food was necessary in the demanding climate that the people lived in. Jesus calls his disciples “You are the salt of the earth” but warns them that salt can lose its effectiveness if it is not used. He also speaks of a lamp which, if put in a basket becomes useless but raised on a lampstand can provide the light that dispels the darkness. In each of these examples he is reminding the people of the words of Isaiah for unless we act as God wants us to and use our gifts to help those in need then we are in danger of becoming worthless salt “no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people’s feet” *David Frank*

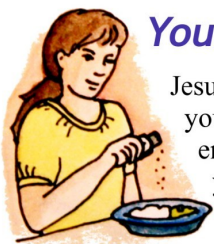

Kids Corner:

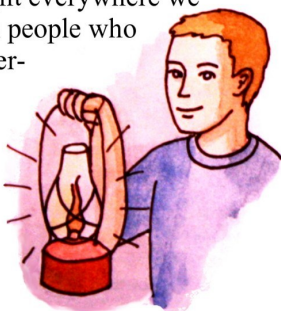


You are the Salt and Light!

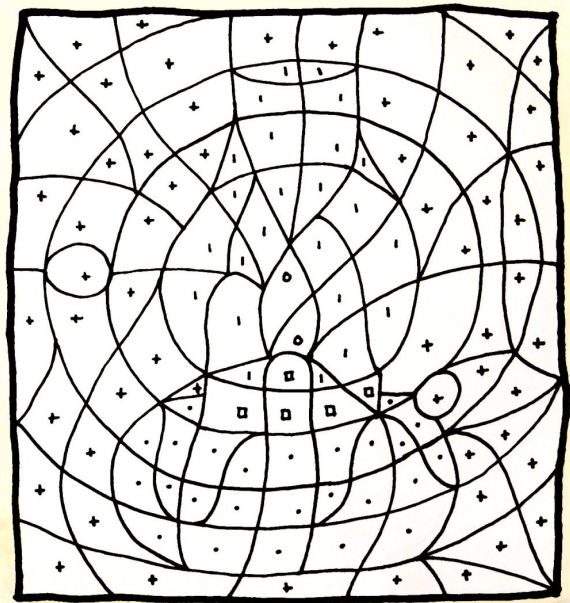
