

EMS community. By coming together to remember the suffering and sacrifice of Jesus, the pupils deepened their understanding of their faith and their commitment to serving others.



Bl Carlo Acutis Relics 24 Hours of Prayer




Jubilee Pledge

As our Year 9 students continue their journey, they carry with them the reminder that they are called to be Christ's hands, feet, and heart in the world.




Feast of St Peter and St Paul



A group of dedicated pupils at EMS have worked throughout the year to bring the Gospel to a wider audience through the power of social media.


