JUBILEE 2025 - We're all invited into an encounter with Jesus Christ, as his disciples of mercy, forgiveness, and social action, and to celebrate our communities. The Holy Door will be open during this Year of Jubilee, where pilgrims are invited to enter and receive a plenary indulgence. The Jubilee indulgence, thanks to the power of prayer, is intended in a particular way for those who have gone before us, so that they may obtain full mercy. To gain a plenary indulgence, a person is invited to complete four specific acts: passing through a Holy Door, go to confession, receive the Eucharist, and pray for the intentions of the Pope. It's a way to show your commitment to living a better life and growing closer to God.

#### First Reading: Jeremiah 17:5-8

# 'Cursed is the man who trusts in man; blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord.'

Thus says the Lord: 'Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

'Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.'

**Response:** Blessed the man who has placed his trust in the Lord.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20

#### 'If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile.'

Brothers and Sisters: If Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

#### **Gospel Acclamation:**

Alleluia, alleluia! Rejoice and leap for joy, says the Lord, for behold, your reward is great in heaven. Alleluia!

#### Gospel Reading Luke 6:17, 20-26

#### 'Blessed are you who are poor. Woe to you who are rich.'

At that time: Jesus came down with the Twelve and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea and Jerusalem and the sea coast of Tyre and Sidon. And he lifted up his eyes on his disciples, and said: 'Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you shall be satisfied. Blessed are you who weep now, for you shall laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, and revile you, and spurn your name as evil on account of the Son of Man! Rejoice in that day, and leap for joy, for behold, your reward is great in heaven; for so their fathers did to the prophets. But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. Woe to you who are full now, for you shall be hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you shall mourn and weep. Woe to you, when all people speak well of you, for so their fathers did to the false prophets.'

#### REFLECTION

There are basic questions about faith in today's readings. In the passage from the prophet Jeremiah. we are asked to compare the man who puts his faith in the world and the man who puts his faith in God. The Book of Jeremiah is born in exile; it is the story of a people who have turned away from God and who have suffered great hardship exiled in Babylon. They suffer from a hardness of heart and the prophet is trying to change those hearts, to turn the people back to faith in God. There are some who rely on the promises of men; they are like dry scrub in the wasteland, for they do not have faith in God. There are some, the remnant of Israel, who have kept the faith, it blooms in them, like a tree by the waterside, and they are blessed in the eyes of their God.

Paul speaks to us of a faith that is based in Jesus Christ and His promise of eternal life. He reminds us of the power of faith in the resurrection. This is a measure of how faith brings us hope; we believe in the resurrection, the empty tomb, and through that faith we can be confident in God's promise of eternal life.

Today's passage from Luke follows the choosing of the twelve from among His disciples. There are three groups of people on this level piece of ground. The Apostles and disciples, the people who have come to listen to His teaching and a group who are looking for the miracle of healing. There is a real sense of the world being present in the various groups assembled. Jesus begins with a carefully balanced series of blessings and woes. He speaks of a world where the poor, the hungry and the mourner find a place of peace and joy but where there is no place for those who enjoy the richness of life. He echoes the poem of Jeremiah and reminds us that our God is not of this world with its ambitions and callous attitudes but of a world filled with God's love.

So, today, we are called to have faith in the love of God and to rely upon His goodness in the midst of a sometimes, uncaring world; we must choose between dry scrub and green trees, whether to follow the path of faith or to put our trust in the world. It is our choice – choose carefully.

more important to you than money and things. If you are hungry then you appreciate food more. If you are sad then sometimes it's easier to remember to pray.


