First Reading: Acts 4:8-12

The name of Jesus Christ is the only name in which we can be saved

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter said: 'Rulers of the people, and elders! If you are questioning us today about an act of kindness to a cripple, and asking us how he was healed, then I am glad to tell you all, and would indeed be glad to tell the whole people of Israel, that it was by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, the one you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by this name and by no other that this man is able to stand up perfectly healthy, here in your presence, today. This is the stone rejected by you the builders, but which has proved to be the keystone. For of all the names in the world given to men, this is the only one by which we can be saved.'

Second Reading: 1 John 3:1-2

We shall be like God because we shall see him as he really is

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us, by letting us be called God's children; and that is what we are.

Because the world refused to acknowledge him, therefore it does not acknowledge us.

My dear people, we are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed; all we know is, that when it is revealed we shall be like him because we shall see him as he really is.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the good shepherd, says the Lord; I know my own sheep and my own know me Alleluia!

Gospel Reading John 10:11-18

The good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep

Jesus said: 'I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep. The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep.

'I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep.

And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd.

'The Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me; I lay it down of my own free will, and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been given by my Father.'

REFLECTION

Easter is the springtime of our lives, a time for growth, a time to renew. We hear, daily, the story of the early church and we wonder at the courage of those men and women who, filled with the Holy Spirit, took their faith out into a hostile world, and began to build God's kingdom here in the muck and glory of our world.

The Apostles took the message to the very top; they challenged the leaders of the Jewish faith to examine their actions and repent. Through the simple human act of healing, of compassion for a suffering beggar, they found the whole authority of the Jewish hierarchy descended upon them. Summoned before the highest religious court in the land they stood there, not as frightened fishermen, but as steadfast committed followers of the Lord and challenged their rulers to change and believe in the Good News.

Each time I read the words of John's letters I am struck by his faith in the love of God. Today he reminds us that we are the children of God. That is a truly awesome statement and one that fills us with hope for if God is on our side who can defeat us! It is up to each of us to live out our lives as children of God, this is not an easy task, there will be many obstacles for us to overcome. It is not a matter of saying we are God's children but of being God's children. Are we ready to put Christ and his church first in our lives?

Whenever I hear the passage about the Good Shepherd. I am reminded of one of the first statements of Pope Francis after his accession to the Throne of Peter. He called on his priests to put on the smell of the sheep, to take the burden of caring for the pastoral needs of the flock of Christ on their shoulders. This is not an easy task, through their ordination priests lay down their personal lives and take up the pastoral and spiritual needs of the people they serve. They do this freely. Throughout their priesthood they are faced time and again with decisions which place our needs before theirs. It is a difficult task. but it can be made easier if we are walking with them in the work in caring for the needs of others.


