THIS WEEK'S PARISH NEWS

ASH WEDNESDAY - This Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, marks the beginning of Lent. We enter into the desert for 40 days as did Jesus prior to his ministry in preparation for Easter. There will be Masses across the parish in each of our Churches with be blessing and distribution of ashes.

NEW CARPET AT ST JOSEPH'S - This coming week, the carpet on the sanctuary will be replaced. The existing carpet is beginning to show it's age, having been down on the sanctuary almost 50 years, and as such is becoming hazardous. We look forward to seeing the new carpet next weekend.

JUBILEE 2025 - We're all invited into an encounter with Jesus Christ, as his disciples of mercy, forgiveness, and social action, and to celebrate our communities. The Holy Door will be open during this Year of Jubilee, where pilgrims are invited to enter and receive a plenary indulgence. The Jubilee indulgence, thanks to the power of prayer, is intended in a particular way for those who have gone before us, so that they may obtain full mercy. To gain a plenary indulgence, a person is invited to complete four specific acts: passing through a Holy Door, go to confession, receive the Eucharist, and pray for the intentions of the Pope. It's a way to show your commitment to living a better life and growing closer to God. The opening times of the Holy Door this week are as follows: Wednesday 11am - 1pm.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM - Application forms for infant Baptism are available at the back of each Church. Please return completed forms to the parish office and come along to a Preparation Meeting to secure your booking. The next Preparation Meeting is on Wed 12th March at 6pm, in the Parish Centre Hall at St Joseph's.

ST PATRCK'S DAY CELEBRATION - Join us for a celebration in St Patrick's Hall on Friday 14th March at 7.30pm for a Pie and Peas Supper. Tickets are available for £5 each at the back our churches.

GIFT AID - We are coming to the end of the financial year and shortly we will be issuing envelopes for 2025–2026. Please note those who use envelopes may find the envelope number has been changed. This is to try and simplify the issue of envelopes and reduce wastage. In future we will be unable to issue envelopes for those who are not in the scheme. There will be an opportunity to join the scheme in March, the Parish benefits greatly from those who are members of the scheme, there is no cost to parishioners as the diocese claims the tax paid by Gift Aid members on their offertory donations from the government. First Reading: Sirach 27:4-7

'Do not praise a man before you hear him reason.'

When a sieve is shaken, the refuse appears; so a person's filth in his thoughts. The kiln tests the potter's vessels; likewise the test of a person is in his reasoning. The fruit discloses the cultivation of a tree; so the expression of a thought discloses the cultivation of a person's mind.

Do not praise a man before you hear him reason, for this is the test of people.

Response: It is good to give thanks to you, O Lord.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:54-58

'He gives us the victory through Jesus Christ.'

Brothers and Sisters: When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' 'O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?'

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labour is not in vain.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! Shine as lights in the world, holding fast to the word of life. Alleluia!

Gospel Reading Luke 6:39-45

'Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks.'

At that time: Jesus told his disciples a parable: 'Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above his teacher, but everyone when he is fully trained will be like his teacher. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the speck that is in your eye", when you yourself do not see the log that is in your own eye? You hypocrite! First take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take out the speck that is in your brother's eye.

'For no good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit, for each tree is known by its own fruit. For figs are not gathered from thorn bushes, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of his heart produces good, and the evil person out of his evil treasure produces evil, for out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks.'

REFLECTION

We cannot know the nature of a person unless we hear them speak. What we say and how we say it reveals much of our individual character. When we listen to someone, we catch a glimpse of the real person behind the words. In the passage from Ecclesiasticus the author teaches us to discern a person's goodness from the way he reasons. "The test of a person is in his reasoning", by the way we speak and what we say, we will be judged.

The words of Paul prepare us for the coming season of Lent. Lent leads us to Our Lord's victory over death and we believe that we share that victory for it wins for us that cloak of imperishability, eternal life. Death has no power over us if we live in faithful service to Our Lord and King, Jesus Christ.

Jesus must have been a brilliant speaker. In today's passage from Luke, we hear many examples of his style. He speaks in familiar language, the language of the people, and you can sense the humour behind the words. If the blind lead the blind then both will fall into a ditch, if a student follows his teacher, then both will repeat the errors they make. Jesus speaks of the splinter and the plank. How often do we criticise someone but fail to see that we too are guilty of a similar or greater fault?

The parable of the good fruit and the rotten fruit speaks to what is in our hearts. If we have goodness at the heart of what we do then we will produce good fruit, however, if our actions and words come from a spiteful or wicked thoughts, then we will produce rotten fruit. We cannot think one way and then act in another. We are either grapes or brambles, our nature depends on what is in our hearts. We may find that we are in a struggle within ourselves when we react to a situation but if our reaction comes from the goodness in our hearts then we follow in the footsteps of Christ.
