ScienceLiving things and Habitats (linking with English)• Describe the differences in the life cycles of a mammal, an amphibian, an insect and a bird• Describe the life process of reproduction in some plants and animals. Pupils might work scientifically by: observing and comparing the life cycles of plants and animals in their local environment with other plants and animals around the world (in the rainforest, in the oceans, in desert areas and in prehistoric times), asking pertinent questions and suggesting reasons for similarities and differences. They might try to grow new plants from different parts of the parent plant, for example, seeds, stem and root cuttings, tubers, bulbs. 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
