


ESSENTIAL VOCABILIARY/WORD BANK

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Pebble	A small stone made smooth and round by water and sand.
Volcano	A mountain that has a small opening that releases lava and gas.
Lava	Hot liquid that erupts from a volcano, when it cools it hardens.
Disintegrate	Break up small parts.
Erosion	When rock is broken down by the wind or water.
Embedded	Object fixed into the ground
Amphibians	Fish or reptiles (frogs).
Glacier	Thick sheet of ice that covers land.

This book tells the story of a pebble, from its start in a fiery volcano 480 million years ago to a busy, modern landscape.


Important information
