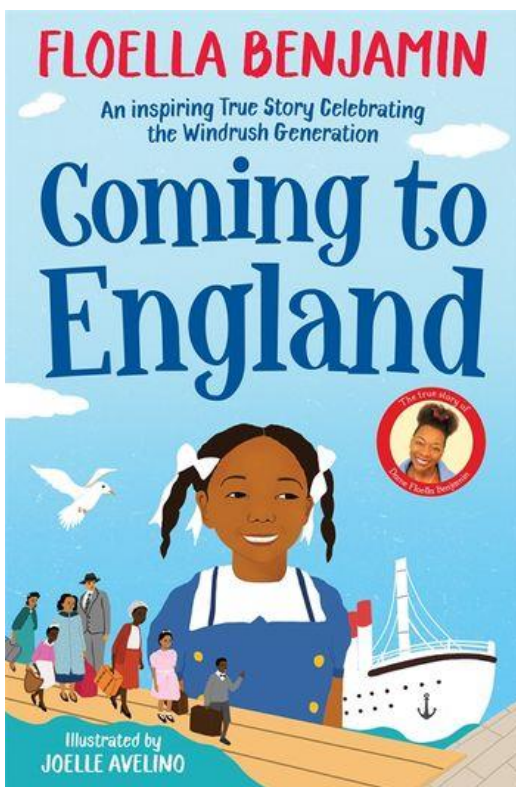
ESSENTIAL VOCABULARY	
Windrush generation	Relating to or denoting the people who emigrated from the Caribbean to Britain on the British ship the <i>Empire Windrush</i> in 1948.
Emigration	The act of leaving one's own country to settle permanently in another; moving abroad.
Adversity	A difficult or unpleasant situation.
Memoir	a historical account or biography written from personal knowledge.
Autobiography	an account of a person's life written by that person.
Breadfruit	large round starchy fruit of a tropical tree, which is used as a vegetable and sometimes to make a substitute for flour.

Example of pronouns to use when writing in first person
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I • We • Me • Us

Adjectives (to describe place and objects)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Spacious • Airy • Cramped • Tight • Homely • Cosy • Comfortable • Bright • Dull • Tiny • Huge • Rugged • Heavy • Light • Smooth <p>Remember to use a comma after an adjective if using more than one.</p>



Examples of writing description in first person
<p>I gazed at the red, dusty, unused chair that always sat in the corner of the dull room. The chair reminded me of my childhood and spending hours reading beautiful fairytales</p> <p>My brothers and I spent hours running around playing games in our glorious garden. We would play hide and seek and make up games that are now lost and forgotten. The shining, golden sun would beat down on us as we lost track of time. We would lay in the green, long grass watching the marshmallow clouds float by until we heard mum calling us in for tea.</p>

Descriptive writing features
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Adjectives • Adverbs (a word or phrase that modifies or qualifies an adjective, verb, or other adverb) "The door creaked loudly every time it was opened" • Figurative language (similes, metaphors, etc.) • Specific detail (e.g., the cosy, yellow sofa was in the corner of the room, right next to the roaring, glorious fireplace). • Writing that is about the senses (smell, taste, touch, see, hear)
