Note taking.

Note taking is not about copying great chunks of information from the internet or a textbook, nor is it copying everything from a teacher's classroom presentation. Note taking means reducing a large amount of information into a smaller, easier to understand and remember set of notes that are in your own words.

Effective note taking includes using:

- bullet points, as they are easier to remember than great chunks of text.
- statements rather than whole sentences.
- headings and sub-headings, highlighters, and symbols to make notes more interesting and easier to remember.

Spelling, punctuation, and grammar

It is usual for students to be awarded marks in coursework, portfolio work and exams for good use of spelling punctuation and grammar. It is essential that you learn how to spell key terminology, as well as use punctuation and grammar correctly.

Skimming and scanning text

You will be required to read quantities of information, either online or from textbooks. You are going to develop the skill of being able to skim and scan text. This is a skill that takes practice and for many, will be new to you, as it is not used often at GCSE.

- Skimming: involves looking quickly through a book and reading only things like contents, headings, introductions, and conclusions. It is a quick and efficient way of familiarising yourself with a publication and is useful if you wish to check whether a book is relevant.
- Scanning: this is a very rapid search for important points. It may be a diagram, a title, or a key word. The essential thing is that you deliberately ignore everything except the one item for which you are scanning.
