


Year 9 Exams: 23rd June 2025

WE REPORT HOW YOU ARE DOING ON A FIVE POINT SCALE







A **ONE** on the scale will mean that you are quite far off where we hope you would be for your age - it will usually mean you need extra support.

A **TWO** on the scale will mean that you are close the level we would expect you to be working at for your age but will need to work on some targets to get there.

A **THREE** on the scale will mean that you are working at the standard we would expect for your age and are learning well.

At GCSE this would be a grade 4 - 6.

A **FOUR** on the scale will mean that you are working at a higher level than many people at your age and are learning at a deep level (top 20% nationally).

At GCSE this would be a grade 7.







A <u>FIVE</u> on the scale will mean that you are <u>WELL ABOVE</u> many people at your age and are learning at a very high level (top 5% nationally).

At GCSE this would be a grade 8 or 9.



Good old fashioned quizzing is an ideal vehicle to get students self-testing, which is proven to be a robust revision strategy, so that students can calibrate their knowledge and remembering. There are various types of quizzes, of course, such as short answer quizzing, multiple choice or a hybrid of the two, with different question types suiting different purposes.












Revision cards are a very common method of revision. They can be used to summarise essential knowledge and make it stick.

They are most effective when pupils use them for self testing using the method below or something similar.









Cornell notes pages are a common note taking method that supports recall. You can put recall clues in the margin and your main notes and summary can also be included.
