

PUPILS IN SEND GROUP 1

Students with communication/interaction or cognitive and learning difficulties (who are less likely to take GCSE's or Level 2 Qualifications that employers recognise) – Pupils will more than likely be educated at Special Schools.

PUPILS IN SEND GROUP 2



SUPPORTED INTERNSHIPS

Supported internships are a **structured study programme** placed with an employer. They enable young people aged 16-24 with a statement of SEN, or an Education, Health and Care plan to achieve sustainable paid employment by equipping them with the skills they need for work, through learning in the workplace.

APPRENTICESHIPS AND TRAINEESHIPS



On an apprenticeship, you are employed to do a real job while studying for a formal qualification - usually for one day a week either at a college or training centre.

Inclusive Apprenticeships allow the Apprentice to use an Entry Level 3 qualification in English or Maths as a lower entry route. A Traineeship is an education and training programme which incorporates work experience, they are designed for people aged 16 to 24 who don't yet have the appropriate skills or experience. Traineeships provide the essential work preparation training, English, Maths and work experience needed to secure an Apprenticeship or employment. Below are some local providers that offer Apprenticeships and Traineeships - local colleges will also offer these.


COLLEGE AND SIXTH FORM



Depending on if you will sit GCSEs or not you could go to sixth form, each sixth form has its own entry requirements but most ask for grades 4 or 5 and above in mainstream schools. Many special schools also have their own sixth forms.

You can also go to college and again, depending on what level you are at, you have the option to study at different levels and courses. This could include supported learning/foundation courses, entry levels courses and other courses ranging from level 1 to 3. Check out the individual colleges and sixth forms websites to find out more details. Below are some Colleges that offer foundation courses and supported learning courses for those pupils educated in special schools - they also offer courses starting from entry level and level 1 upwards.

SPECIALIST COLLEGES

There are also 'Specialist Colleges' - this option is generally only available if you are not able to access your local college courses. You can agree the funding with your local authority SEN team and you would need to show that you have considered your local colleges courses.
