

# Safeguarding



#### **Urgent Winter Water Safety Message**

RLSS UK offer safety advice for winter water safety, with simple steps to keep safe during the winter:

- 1. Never go onto the ice to play, to retrieve an object, or a pet
- 2. Never enter the ice to rescue somebody, call 999 and ask for the Fire and Rescue Service

#### What to do if you fall through the ice:

- Keep calm and shout for 'help'
- Spread your arms across the surface of the ice in front of you
- If the ice is strong enough, kick your legs to slide onto the ice

- Lie flat and pull yourself towards the bank
- If the ice breaks, work your way to the bank-breaking the ice in front of you anyway
- If you cannot climb out, wait for help and keep as still as possible. Press your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the water
- Once you are safe, go to hospital immediately for a check up What to do if you see someone fall through the ice:
- Shout for assistance and phone the emergency services call 999 or 112
- Do not walk or climb onto the ice to attempt a rescue
- Shout to the casualty to 'keep still' and offer reassurance to keep them calm
- Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach
- When reaching from the bank, lie down to avoid being pulled onto the ice
- If you cannot reach them, slide something which floats, such as a plastic bottle or football, across the ice for them to hold onto to stay afloat whilst help is on the way
- If the casualty is too far away, do not attempt to rescue them. Wait for the emergency services while calming and reassuring the casualty

#### **Crewe and Nantwich Apprenticeship Fair**

We know that a number of our year 11 students are interested in securing an Apprenticeship for September. I am excited to announce that CCSW will be hosting the first Crewe and Nantwich Jobs and Apprenticeship Fair on Monday 5th February. This event is specifically targeted at school and college leavers looking for apprenticeships and/or employment in 2024 and as well as there being an opportunity to speak directly to local employers who are recruiting in 2024 Cheshire College and the Pledge will also be delivering talks on the night around apprenticeships and how to apply. Information on how parents, carers and students can book on will be circulated early in the new year.

#### **Skills Builder**

I am delighted to announce that we have been successful in our bid to become a facilitator of the Skills Builder Accelerator programme. The Accelerator programme supports schools and colleges to build their students' essential skills alongside their academic achievements. These are highly transferable skills such as creativity, problem solving, and teamwork. Teachers benefit from training and resources, and the programme supports schools to train an in-house expert who can continue the strategy once the programme ends.

Research released by the Skills Builder Partnership shows:

- People with strong essential skills earn an average £3,600-£4,600 more a year.
- About 18 per cent of the working population has above average education level yet poor life outcomes because of their lack of access to skills building opportunities.
- Strong essential skills are highly related to high job and life satisfaction.
- Ninety-two per cent of people believe essential skills are important for success in their career.
- Essential skills are strongly linked with increased well being.
- Building these skills means you're 52 per cent less likely to be out of work or education.

When we return in January we will be launching the Skills Builder framework with our students through our CHARACTER curriculum. Utilising assemblies, form time and in lessons, staff will start to explicitly teach these 8 essential skills to ensure that students develop consciousness of their strengths & areas for development.

#### Year 8 & 9 Update

As a year group year 8 have achieved 92.2% and year 9 91.8%, which both are higher than the national average. A fantastic achievement. In year 9 our highest attenders are Gresley, and in year 8 Webb! Well done Mrs Bains and Mr Murphy.

What a fantastic term its been, with pupils reflecting out school values of inspire believe and achieve. This is reflected in the achievement points distributed by teachers across the Oaks academy. In Year 8 a massive 8562 achievement points have been awarded for a variety of reasons. 8 Claughton were the highest achieving form with 1683 achievement points. Our role models in the year group are Leah – Marie D and Scarlett C both with 141 achievement points. #### Year 10

Year 10 have continued their good start to the academic year. We are proud of the start they have made in their CGSEs, pupils are enthusiastic and demonstrating a real determination to achieve. As well as GCSEs this year they will have additional opportunities linked to developing them as

individuals who can succeed in the wider world. They have started to create a Curriculum Vitae to prepare them for their places at college and future careers, and complete letters of application ready for a mock interview and work experience day later in the year. We are really proud of the professionalism and seriousness that they have shown in the completion of these tasks.
