What is PEGI?

The PEGI system is designed to inform the public of what's suitable and what's not for different ages. It can be a helpful tool in helping you to decide what games are appropriate for your child.

PEGI's professional analysts look at hundreds of video games every year and determine what is suitable for different age groups using a set of criteria.

This criteria has been established by experts in the field of child protection, psychology, the law and media. It helps analysts to decide what game content is appropriate in each of the five rating groups.

How are games rated under PEGI?

All games released in the UK will have one of the following PEGI age ratings on the packaging: 3, 7, 12, 16 or 18. The rating means that the game shouldn't be played by a young person under that age.

Why? Because there may be content within the game which could potentially be harmful, frightening or worrying to children. As well as an age rating, PEGI also uses icons showing content descriptors, letting you know if a game contains: violence, drugs, bad language, discrimination, fear, gambling, sex, or in-app purchases.

Is PEGI legally enforceable?

Yes - in the UK, the PEGI 12, 16 and 18 ratings are legally enforceable. This means that retailers cannot sell or hire these games to those below these ages. However, this only applies to the retailer, it doesn't stop an adult or someone older from buying the games for a child.

Remember - PEGI ratings are based on safety and *not* game difficulty. Lots of children want to be challenged by games and believe an older rated game will be harder.

Need more advice?

For extra age rating information about a game, use the <u>Additional Consumer Information (ACI)</u>. Use the 'search' function to find a game and you'll get a breakdown of the content, including:

- How much graphic content appears in the game;
- How often/where it appears and how strong it is.

This is a great tool for confirming you are making the right choice in the games your child may be playing.

You may come across a game which doesn't carry a PEGI rating but may feature a rating from non-European countries. These ratings carry no weight in the UK or Europe and should not be taken at face value as their criteria may not be in line with UK guidance.

The D of E Practice expedition took place on the weekend of 24th-25th June in the Peckforton Hills. The pupils gathered at the meeting point before setting off to their campsite. On day one pupils took it in turns to navigate different legs of the journey and became proficient at using a map and compass in the field. One pupil commented that "maps take on a whole new meaning when you are relying on them to find your way to the campsite". During the day pupils experienced a heard of cows, horses and ponies as well as some fairly challenging styles. Kyle also temporarily adopted a dog that had escaped. Towards the second part of the day we climbed up to the trig point at Rawhead which is 227M above sea level, before making our way back down to the Cheshire Plain and to the campsite.

Once we arrived at camp pupils set up tents, topped up their water and cooked meals on their camp stoves. The weather was great and there was a sense of achievement in camp as the sun went down and they headed into their tents for a well-earned rest. The next morning pupils prepared breakfast, packed up their tents and equipment before planning their routes to the pick up point. This time groups were working as teams to ensure that they followed their route Alfie S took a bearing where no path was evident and helped his team to negotiate a tricky part of the route.



Overall the weather held for most of the weekend allowing the first team to reach the end point before it broke. However the second team were not so lucky, being caught in a torrential downpour whilst thunder rattled the skies. Still it was great training as they quickly donned their waterproofs and completed their route as the rain bounced off the track around them. Rhys B and Kyle C showed excellent leadership throughout the weekend and have been awarded additional Golden Moments for this on top of the Golden Moments awarded to all other pupils who took part in this challenging but rewarding weekend.

The assessment expedition will take place on the 23rd-24th of September near Macclesfield Forest and will involve pupils navigating from check point to checkpoint whilst being assessed on their navigation, camp craft and team work. The group will also be launching several charity events in the new school year as part of their volunteering section of the award. We are also looking forward to launching our first Silver D of E canoeing expedition next year with many of our current Bronze cohort already expressing an interest.


Careers in the Community





Have a wonderful summer, I look forward to seeing all the students back with us in September looking super smart in their school uniforms.



Literacy



To support the development of academic literacy across the curriculum and the love for reading, selected students have been entered into a range of exciting interventions. The Lexonik program is a 6 week interactive tool that includes competitive practise of word sounds and understanding of phonics. So far, over 60 students have taken part in this throughout the year in groups of 6 and both the feedback and results have been fantastic! To support our students further, our Learning Resource Centre lead Miss Lane has been inviting students to take part in her reading groups, where pupils get involved in analysing books and becoming familiar with word-reading. Getting our students reading is a priority, but we understand that this can sometimes be challenging – please feel free to come along to parental engagement sessions with our Academic Literacy Lead Miss Phillips! Miss Phillips has held two sessions to date, and these will continue twice each term in our next academic year! These sessions focus on reading and literacy skills at home, offering support and in depth knowledge of how to aid your child's journey of reaching their potential and beyond!



House System



As the current academic year draws to a close, we would like to take a moment to let you know about an exciting new innovation happening at the Oaks Academy. Starting from the upcoming academic year, we will be introducing a House System.

How will it work?

All Key stage three pupils and their form tutors will be placed into one of six Houses. They will belong to this same House for the duration of their time at the academy. As members, students will be encouraged to do their best for their House. Throughout the year, they will participate in a range of inter-house competitions for which they will earn achievement points. These may include academic challenges, sports tournaments, art competitions and much more. Additionally, points will also be awarded for good behaviour, effort in learning and community spirit. Achievement points will be awarded via Satchel One and will be counted termly to judge which House has collectively won the most points.

The points earned will contribute to the overall standing of the House, with regular updates and announcements to keep the students motivated and engaged. The House competition culminates with an end of year celebration assembly during which trophies and certificates are awarded to individuals who have shown outstanding levels of achievement throughout the academic year. The House with the highest overall points, will be crowed champions and awarded the prestigious House Cup: a real highlight!

House Names:

As a school located in Crewe, we would like to celebrate the town's unrivalled heritage as a pioneer of railway engineering. Indeed, Crewe has long been synonymous with locomotive innovation, producing some of the most iconic and ground-breaking trains of the time. With this in mind, our












Subject Awards Evening

We have given our students a number of opportunities this year to think about future careers in science. We have had guest speakers from industry to share their experiences working as scientists in a variety of setting such as drug research and medicine. Our year 11 have also been given the opportunity on a Tuesday evening to take part in A level taster course at the local college.

Earlier in the year we took 30 of our year 11 students to Wales for a residential study weekend it really was a great experience for teachers and students.

We worked on studying the key features of the science of GCSE science curriculum and enhancing study skills. In our free time we visited the local beach, laughed, danced and took part in a fun quiz.

Further to this we have also been running a Saturday morning revision club for our year 11 students all year which was very well attended.

Next year we look forward to introducing Triple Science at GCSE to our curriculum for the first time, this is an exciting opportunity for our students particularly those who aspire to future science-based careers



English Focus



Oh wow! What a year 2022-23 has been!


Across English, our focus this year has been to raise expectations with reading and writing which we have successfully done from year 7 to 11 through the use of reading and writing tasks designed throughout our curriculum to allow all students to practice key skills necessary for success throughout their exams and the wider world. Students have also had opportunities to practice Spoken Language skills- Year 7 have completed the English Speaking Board programme, delivering a presentation about a topic of their choice to their class, and year 9 have completed the Spoken Language component of the English Language GCSE by writing and delivering a speech entitled 'Don't get me started on...!'

Next year, English really want to focus on making English the Golden Standard across the academy; leading on Literacy across the school, engaging in new and exciting topics to be taught in English lessons and really giving our students a love for the subject. For us at Team English, this is hugely important when ensuring your children are ready for their GCSEs and their lives after school. We're looking at embedding even more lessons in the Library, lots more opportunities for spoken language lessons and every necessary to support your children to be inspired in English, to believe in themselves in order to achieve academically and in society!

Sadly, with this we are saying goodbye to two members of Team English: Mr Malone and Miss Latham are both heading off to pastures new and we wish them both the very best.

But alongside goodbyes, we will be saying hello to three new members of the team in September, ready for another exciting year into 23-24- and we can't wait to get started!

Humanities Focus



Curriculum

Curriculum development has been a priority across humanities this year. We have re-written our Schemes of work so they are ambitious, broad, connected and well sequenced. We have also tried to make the lessons and enjoyable for pupils as possible so that they engage better. Our Curriculum builds on the Knowledge and skills developed at Primary school. We follow the Key Stage 3 national curriculum for Geography and History and the local Syllabus for RE. We follow AQA syllabus for Humanities at Key Stage 4 and select topics that are relevant to our pupils and setting.

To bring our subjects together we have delivered a Crewe Regeneration Project for pupils to apply their skills and knowledge in the local community. We had a fantastic tour of Crewe Town Centre by Councillor Ben Wye who wrote to our Head teacher saying,

Dear Peter,

I just wanted to congratulate you, the staff and the pupils for such a thought provoking session in Crewe on Tuesday after school.

I was truly impressed by the dedication of the staff who took time out to bring the dozen pupils who were really engaged and asked extremely useful questions, that normally aren't considered. We were lucky enough to have an impromptu simulated debate in the Municipal Buildings Council chamber about the wisdom of having more drive through restaurants, which is being debated in 'real life' currently. How I wish they could have attended Sotuhern Planning!

Ethan And Evie, in particular made me reflect on some of the plans for the town regeneration. This is as it should be, as it is your pupils who have the biggest stake in the town.

The Next connected local project will be the Battle of Nantwich! Researching why this area was so strategically important in the English Civil War. We will explore the impact of Religion and History and the geography of Nantwich that made it such a draw to people in the past.

We build on this enrichment with Cultural Capital Cross Curricular Homework's which gives pupils the opportunity to research independently about topics and combine all Humanities skills each Half term. E.g.

RE have had a visit to St Barnabas Church for year 10 RE CGSE pupils to explore Christian worship and practices. We will be looking to next book a trip to a Buddhist Temple. We are also proposing a trip to Liverpool to compare the Roman Catholic and Anglican Cathedrals, and explore the Christmas festival of Christmas and investigate the influence of Christianity at the Liverpool Christmas market. Geography took pupil to Liverpool One and Formby Beech to Complete their Fieldwork Skills and we have a combined Humanities Visit to Ypres, Belgium planned for next February, we are very much looking forward to and teachers are squabbling to get on the trip!!!

History has excelled with its History and Politics Club to compliment the humanities department and give keen students the opportunity to expand their historical knowledge. Politics Club also ties political discussion and ideological differences in British and European society into an ambitious curriculum. Together, these clubs enrich student understanding and give foundations for students wanting to go into civic or political spheres of work.

Also, the Equality club has taken over from Pride Club to support more students in a changing Crewe demographic. It became apparent from PHSCE lessons that some cultures within Crewe do not follow the school expectations when it comes to equality and diversity. Equality club is an opportunity to work with students with protected characteristics and provides a safe space for students of all backgrounds and circumstances.

We would like to welcome Three New Staff, Alex Brookes Assistant Headteacher and History Specialist, in September Emma Lavens new Geography and RE teacher, Liam Kirkpatrick new Geography and RE teacher, New Curriculum team leaders are Liane Roberts and Jon Austin.

Students across all year groups also studied a range of Spanish traditions and culture, such as el día de los Muertos (the day of the dead), La Navidad (Christmas), Semana Santa (Holy week), and Christopher Columbus' discovery of America.

Art & Technology Focus



Art

Throughout the year pupils at The Oaks Academy have been working on a variety of work covering different Art skills.

Year 7 have made a great start to their Art education at the Oaks, we started by working on their Basic Art skills, including colour theory, drawings and mark making skills using the theme of Bugs and Insects. We also looked at the artist.....who uses collage to create art work, pupils then worked in her style to create some interesting final pieces. Over the last term year 7 have been studying portraiture, and learning about the artists Pablo Picasso and Loui Jover, they have created final pieces that have been inspired by both artists,

Year 8 have learnt lots of new skills this year through two projects, their first project was inspired by Architecture, pupils enjoyed learning how to draw building and the technique of 1&2 point perspective, they have also learnt about the architect Antoni Gaudi and created buildings suing his ideas. During the last term we have been inspired by the theme Sweet Treats, pupils have developed their drawing skills and have shown some fantastic presentation skills in their sketchbooks. Year 8 pupils then developed their textiles skills including hand and machine stitching, applique and felting. Pupils have been working on some great final pieces inspired by their drawings and combining their painting and textiles skills.

Year 9 has spent the year working on theme of Africa, they started by created hand made sketchbooks which included drawings and research and a big emphasis on their presentation skills. As part of developing their different rt skills year 9 created clay masks and use of printing skills. Pupils then designed their own final piece idea bringing together the various different painting, drawing and textiles skills they ah worked on throughout the year.





Design Technology

Across Design Technology this year, we have seen rapid growth in our practical offering, with all our workshops (Wood work, Metal work and CAD/CAM centre) now up and running with all year groups across The OAKS. Students have had the opportunities to work with a range of materials and design software to generate a range of practical items this year. It has been an exciting year of development within the subject, and students across all year groups have had the ability to thrive in this practical environment. With this in mind, we are now offering both Design Technology and Engineering Design across KS4, and have further developments in the pipeline with Art to offer opportunities for Textiles design.





Food Technology

Year 7 King Charles Cupcake Competition.

This year, the Coronation of King Charles III gave our Year 7 pupils the opportunity to not only learn about the Royal Family and how succession works but also how to; plan, design and produce a product suitable for such an event.

There was a strict criterion to complete that enabled the pupils to demonstrate resilience and strict time management. The criteria included not only the design task and the making and decorating of the cake, it also included the completion of two link homework tasks and a final evaluation; with all work linked to the competition being finished to the pupils highest standard. Year 7 pupils were enthused from the very beginning.

Some amazing outcomes have been produced as a result, with the overall winner will be announced during the final week of term. They will be collecting a Certificate and trophy (to keep) as well as a complete cake decorating kit (also to keep).

Year 8 Victoria Sponge Competition.

The annual Victoria Sponge competition took place for the Year 8 pupils. This project giving them the opportunity to not only learn about the planning, design and production. It also enabled them to experience and develop their skills in resilience, time management and problem solving.


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
Photography

Performing Arts & Vocational Focus



As a faculty we pride ourselves in offering a rich, creative and inclusive curriculum. Our subjects enrich, inspire and challenge students through balancing a combination of academic, practical and creative engagement ensuring that students develop both the subject-specific knowledge and skills fundamental to success in our subjects. We have had a really positive year with our students demonstrating their effort, determination and resilience. Our lessons aim to fully immerse students in our subjects.

Here are some examples from our subjects of what students have been working on:

Music

Students have been developing their performance, composition, listening and appraising skills throughout the year. They have explored music from a wide range of traditions, genres and styles ensuring coverage of classical, popular and world music. Lessons consist of practical exploration of the style, developing skills related to composition or performance, as well as learning about what makes each style of music sound like it does exploring musical elements and theoretical concepts. Over recent months students have started to develop their music technology skills, which is a very exciting development with our new facilities and relevant to the music industry as this is how composers and music producers work. They have been using BandLab software with midi keyboards and audio interfaces to learn about chord construction and chord performance and composition skills, perform and record rock 'n' roll accompaniment patterns and compose pop songs using loops as well as recording live audio tracks.



Drama

Students have been developing their knowledge of practical skills in Drama. This term Year 7 have been exploring Theatre in Education using storytelling and direct address to explore various educational topics including bullying, stranger danger and peer pressure. In Year 8 students have been looking at Silent Movies and the early era of film from mime to slapstick comedy has meant students have created some outstanding pieces of Drama. Year 9 have been devising their own stories to act. They had had to work with a Bernardo's advert that depicts a picture of a homeless man called Carl White. They have managed to create an entire backstory for this mysterious character. Year 11 gave fantastic scripted performances in February to an audience before the examiner visited to assess their performances. They also went to the Lyceum Theatre in March to watch a live performance of Blood Brothers.




Business

In Business lessons this year the students have worked incredibly hard and made really good progress. The Year 11 students have worked especially hard preparing for their GCSE exams and futures beyond school. It is fantastic that so many of our students will be continuing their Business studies at A level, T Level or BTEC at college.

We have a record number of Year 10 students studying Business this year who have all brought their own ideas and contribution to lessons. They have spent some time discussing their plans as future entrepreneurs and business leaders. Some Year 10 participated in the Young Enterprise 10X Challenge in March consisting of a fun workshop session with local business leaders followed by them being given £10 to develop a pop-up business. There was some success, but also some lessons learnt! We will be launching a similar competition in the Autumn term with our new Year 10 students.

IT and Creative iMedia

Year 10 Creative iMedia students have been developing their skills using different Adobe products to create unique images to a specific brief, as well as becoming more confidence with using graphic tablets. Since the arrival of the graphic tablets students have been creating animations to use in their own characters/images and then creating multi-layer animations.



Health and Social Care

This year the Health and Social Care students in Year 10 have looked at the life stages from 5 to 65+ years through childhood, adolescence, adulthood and older adulthood. Everyone's life is different and many different factors affect life stages in varying ways. They also looked at the changes associated with the development from childhood to older adulthood and the factors that can influence this development, and examined expected and unexpected life events and the effect they can have on an individual's life. Finally they researched how individuals can be supported by service providers. In Year 11 the Health and Social Care students took part in a First Aid workshop day with visiting experts learning valuable life skills such as resuscitation.

PE and Sport Studies

Football league (September – October)

At the start of the academic Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 represented the school in a Level 2 Games competition against local schools. Year 10 had success by beating Ruskin, whilst gaining a point against both SWS and a last-minute equaliser against STM. Year 8 played well during the season and had some very closely fought games in all matches. Year 7 won dramatically against Ruskin while they narrowly lost against STM. Hopefully next year will bring some further matches against local schools and an opportunity to build on the progress from this year.

Year 8 Girls Football

One of the biggest success stories over the last two years has been the development of girls football. This has seen the introduction of an 11 a side team that has competed against Ruskin in full games and 6 a side tournament. The girls have worked hard and showed a good standard of play against Ruskin in which they were very successful. Hopefully next year will bring more games against the local schools and continue to build on the excellent work from this season.

Badminton (October- April)

During the Autumn half term students from Key Stage 3 attended Badminton club, allowing them to play games against other students in various year groups. Hopefully this is a club that will continue to grow and allow opportunities for inter school competitions against local high schools.

South Cheshire Cup (February Half term)

After February half term the South Cheshire Cup was re-introduced. We were given a very challenging draw away at Alsager in the opening round. All teams played well, but unfortunately came up against strong teams in Year 7, 8 and 10. Sadly we exited the competition at this point.

Crewe ABC Boxing

At the start of the academic year students from Key Stage 3 were selected to take part in a Boxing project that ran for 12 weeks. The aim was to help improve activity levels, but to also work on other skills needed such as confidence. As the project ran through the year it allowed other groups of students to access. A big thank you to Harewood's for funding the project through the year, and I am sure that the students will benefit greatly from participating in it.

ECB Girls Cricket Project

Prior to Easter half term, we enrolled in an ECB Cricket programme that looked to promote Girls Cricket. Over the 6 weeks the groups were coached on the basic skills required in the game and applied these in different game formats. The aim is to continue this project next academic year and compete against other schools in Level 2 games.
