Headteachers Update



Dear Parents and carers

We have made a great start to the new term and welcomed lots of new staff and students to our school. We continue to go from strength to strength. Over the past 2-3 years our student numbers have grown by 50% and we have welcomed many more additional specialist staff. We continue on our journey to excellence, and are delighted with the commitment we see from our students in terms of positive behaviours, attendance and their learning.

We continue apace with our site improvements – this has included creating 3 new additional classrooms, including a new science room over the summer break, all needed due to accommodating our increasing numbers of students with high quality facilities. Our work continues and we have plans to upgrade the Food Technology teaching space, student toilets and changing rooms, and corridors over the forthcoming 12 months.

We were really pleased with the continued improvement in GCSE results in the summer. Many of our students even exceeded their nationally measured expected progress. The school has made significant progress in the last 3 years and these results also reflect our students following ambitious and challenging curriculum pathways which include significant numbers being entered for the English Baccalaureate. These entries exceed both national and Cheshire East averages. The school is delighted with students achieving a third of a grade improvement in expected progress outcomes when compared with pre-pandemic results.

The school is keen to connect with our former students – and in October we were delighted to welcome back a group of former students (several in their 80s) who attended the grammar school which was founded in our building. They had a lovely time reminiscing about their school. We are so grateful for all the support our community offers the school.

Thank you, indeed, to you as parents for your ongoing support and commitment.

Reading with your child



Reading to and with your child regularly – ideally every evening for at least fifteen minutes - can make a dramatic difference to a child's achievement within school. A report from the Oxford University Press highlights the importance of parents reading with their children thus: "Children who read outside of class are 13 times more likely to read above the expected level for their age." Furthermore, pupils who spend time reading outside of school achieve better grades at GCSE and are more confident with the demands of college, university, and the world of work.

The report also offers six tips for reading with your child at home:

- 1. Make time to read to your child for fifteen minutes a day.
- 2. Choose a variety of fictional and non-fictional books to read.
- 3. Take turns reading with your child.
- 4. Talk about the book- stop at several points in the story and ask your child what he/she thinks will happen next.
- 5. Pay attention to the language and encourage your child to use a dictionary or the internet to check the definition of words they may not understand.
- 6. Enjoy reading!

All pupils in Years 7 and 8 have extra time on their timetable for reading lessons. The school would very much appreciate your support in ensuring that your child is engaging with reading at home. Please make time in the evening for your child to read a suitable book with you.

Academic Literacy Interventions

As a school we have introduced Accelerated Reader to our Year 7's and Year 8's. It is an exciting reading programme used nationally to encourage students to read while also challenging them to improve their comprehension skills and read challenging books. Students take a reading test which gives each student a guide to the level of book they should be reading. They then read the book, and once finished take a quiz on what happened in the story; if they pass they gain points which at The Oaks Academy means prizes! To support your child to meet their reading goals you can ask them what they are currently reading and talk about what has happened in the story so far, you can also encourage them to come to The Oaks Learning Resource Centre regularly to borrow books at the right level for them.

Lexia


All pupil in Year 7 and Year 8 have access to Lexia - a software programme which is proven to improve students literacy levels. It works on areas such as word meaning and grammar. When students first use the software they are assessed for their level, and then the programme automatically adapts to be at the right level of challenge. This means that students in the same class will be seeing different questions depending on their own personal ability. This ensures that each student is allowed to progress at their own pace, and their progression is monitored. All students in Year 7 and Year 8 are expected to complete at least 30 minutes a week using Lexia during Form time. Students are welcome to access Lexia during break, lunch or after school in the LRC or from home. Please encourage your child to do at least 30 minutes per week at home as this will really support their literacy levels.

We are also pleased to let you know that The Oaks now have their own e-library! Students will be able to access and borrow e-books from home onto to read on any electronic device using their school log-in information. The link is below; happy reading!







ADHD Awareness Month

Attendance



This is an article informing you about attendance. We wish to work with you and offer help and support, if needed, to help your child attend school. It is vital that all students have excellent attendance at The Oaks Academy.

Research shows that even a few days of absence can have a negative impact on students' performance. Here at The Oaks we are committed to working with students and parents/carers to achieve our overall academy attendance target 97%. The Oaks Academy values all students and believes they are entitled to an excellent education. As set out in our attendance policy, we will work with families to identify the reasons for poor attendance and try to resolve any difficulties. Early intervention will be a priority. The Oaks Academy define our key levels of attendance as:

Spotlight on Punctuality

It is important that your child attends school every day and on time. Arriving late to school is unsettling for children and disrupts the start to their day.

Did you know?

10 minutes late every day = 33 hours lost learning each year!!

Routines

The easiest way to ensure your child attends school on time every day is to establish a GOOD EVENING AND MORNING ROUTINE. If mornings are hectic in your household, prepare as much as possible the night before. The school day starts at 8.30am. The teachers are waiting on the AstroTurf for their class from 8.30am. The pupil entrance gates close at 8.45am. Please ensure your child is in school before the registers close.

If your child arrives after this time, then they MUST go to Pupil reception to sign in late. These late procedures are in place so that every child is entered onto the register correctly and can be accounted for in the event of an emergency. This is to ensure the health and safety of YOUR child, so please make sure that these procedures are followed at all times.

Home Learning

Homework is an essential part of school life as it provides an opportunity to consolidate and reflect on learning and prepare for future learning. Homework develops valuable skills such as concentration, time management, research and academic rigour so that all students leave ready for study at college and future employment.

Satchel One is the online platform that The Oaks Academy will use for the setting and monitoring of homework. All staff will use Satchel One to set homework, all students will use it as a means of accessing homework set by subject teachers and all parents will have access to see the homework. Students will be able to communicate with their teachers via Satchel One regarding the homework.

Please download the Satchel One app from the App Store or Google Play Store. Or you can visit the website at **www.satchelone.com/login** to access the platform. Please see slips attached to this letter for further guidance.

Student Accounts: Students don't need a separate username and password for Satchel One. Instead, students should use the Sign in with Office 365 button and enter their school email address and password to login.

Parent Accounts: Parents who wish to take a more active role in their children's home learning can achieve this by having their own Satchel One account. It enables them to take a more proactive role in driving homework prioritisation, and keeping tabs on homework without having to be intrusive. Parents sign-up for accounts directly with Satchel One using student specific PIN codes issued last week. Progress Leaders will be able to issue your PIN code if it has been misplaced.

Faculty Welcome



English

The English department would like to welcome back Years 8, 9, 10 & 11, and extend a warm welcome to the year 7s who have only just begun their Oaks journey- and what a start they've all had! We've also welcomed new Teachers to Team English: Miss Ellams, Miss Carlise and Mr Barnard who have all made a great start. The English Curriculum at The Oaks Academy has been completely rebuilt to offer the perfect bespoke package of English Mastery to your children.

In English we teach students to learn to love stories in Y7. Our curriculum is designed to give students a smooth transition from KS2 into KS3: last year, we have worked closely with local Primary Schools to explore links between our curriculum and theirs. We also want students to begin learning higher level English skills such as language analysis, structure analysis and context through texts that are exciting and that spark their imaginations and curiosity. Y7 is all about learning to learn to love stories and celebrating imagination.

Year 7 is connected by the theme of Heroes and Villains and is designed to offer students alternative viewpoints on traditional heroes and villains. We teach our transition scheme 'Monsters' in the first term to aid a smooth transition from primary to secondary education, focusing on a variety of monster across literature, from the Medusa to Jurassic Park. Year 8 have begun to take an alternative look at the world, with more focus of taking our students outside of Crewe to develop that cultural capital, which builds upon the component skills of year 7, with a focus on Unheard Voices. In Y8 students continue to develop their critical approach to literature, both fiction and non-fiction, though more complex genres and extracts of texts; beginning with an exploration of Cultural and unheard voices poetry. Year 9 moves further into the knowledge of more historical fiction, going back in time and moving through different genres, looking in detail at less explored Genres in English such

as Detective fiction, which is designed to be bespoke for the needs of our students but also to begin to prepare students for GCSE, by reading 19th and 20th century texts and genres.

Year 10 has begun work on their English Language and Literature GCSES: first by exploring Different voices and perspectives in Language, while studying A Christmas Carol in Literature. Year 11 continue to work hard, studying English Language Paper 2 and An Inspector Calls in their lessons.

You can support your child by asking them to recite the plot of the Literature texts, and by encouraging them to read a variety of different texts and stories.


Maths







You can support your child at home by regularly checking satchel one for home learning as teachers will post all home learning here. Most of all, show an interest in what they are doing in maths. Talk to your child about what they have been doing in maths today/this week. Can they talk you through what they have learnt, how they answered that question, explain what each bit means, how did they get that? The more a student talks about what they have learnt, the longer they will retain it. Explaining to you or their friends helps them to embed and consolidate their new skills, gives them confidence and makes them proud of themselves.

Modern Foreign Languages

Bienvenidos!

Here is an oversight of each year group's learning this year in the Modern Foreign Languages Faculty.

Year 7 will be learning to discuss their lives, including basic information about themselves, their free time, their school, their family and their hometown.

Year 8 will be discovering how to describe their holidays, their use of technology, food and drink that they eat, their outings with friends and a visit to another city.

Year 9 will be looking at how to discuss their free time, their future plans for jobs, their health, the rights of young people and a visit to a Spanish city.

Year 10 will be learning to describe their holidays, their school and comparing to schools in Spain, their family and use of technology, how they spend their free time and their hometown and neighbourhood.

Year 11 have begun to learn to describe festivals celebrated in Spain and other Spanish speaking festivals, will explore how to discuss their future plans for jobs and careers and finally look at discussing how they look after the environment.

In addition to this we will discover how Spanish speaking countries celebrate important festivals such as the Day of the Dead, Christmas and Easter.

In order to support your child's progress in lessons, it is recommended to engage with the satchel one platform, where class teachers will set weekly vocab quizzes. There are also a variety of websites

available to use at home to further support classroom learning. We recommend using Duolingo (also available as an app).

Performance and Vocational Faculty

Welcome to the Performance and Vocational Faculty. As a faculty we pride ourselves in offering a rich, creative and inclusive curriculum. Our subjects enrich, inspire and challenge students through balancing a combination of academic, practical and creative engagement ensuring that students develop both the subject-specific knowledge and skills fundamental to success in our subjects. Our lessons aim to fully immerse students in our subjects. Here is an overview of our exciting and interactive curriculums.

Music

In Key Stage 3 students develop a range of performance and composition skills, as well as their listening skills and theoretical knowledge. In Year 7 projects include Vocal Performance Skills, I've Got Rhythm, Keyboard Performance Skills, Melody, Structure and Pitch, Ukulele Performance Skills and Chords and Accompaniment Patterns. Year 8 projects include Dance Music, Soundtracks, Ground Bass and Remix, Blues and Rock 'n' Roll. Year 9 projects include Live Lounge, Video Game Music, Hooks and Riffs, Popular Song, Reggae and New Directions. A practical approach to the development of performance and composition skills, as well as regular listening and theory work enables students to access the BTEC Music course offered at Key Stage 4 where students explore music products and styles through performance, composition, music production and recording skills.







Drama

In Key Stage 3 students develop their understanding of drama skills, scripted performance work and devised performance work. They do this through exploring a range of different styles of drama. In Year 7 projects include An Introduction to Drama, A Christmas Carol, Greek Theatre, The Tempest, Theatre in Education and A Monster Calls. In Year 8 projects include A Victorian Child, Rose Blanche, Silent Movies, Melodrama, War of the Worlds and Missing Dan Nolan. In Year 9 projects include 'Face' The Play, Warden X, Carl White, Refugee Crisis and Responding to Stimulus. A practical approach to developing drama performance skills in a range of styles enables students to access the Level 1/2 Vocational Award (Technical Award) at Key Stage 4 where students learn about a range of styles and genres, explore texts through performance and devise and create drama performances.



Computing and Creative iMedia

In Key Stage 3 students develop their understanding and skills in relation to the three strands of information technology, digital literacy and computer science. In Year 7 projects include Office Applications, Graphics and Scratch. In Year 8 projects include Understanding Computers, Animation and Microbit. In Year 9 projects include Web Development and Cyber Security, Video Production, Networks, Spreadsheets and Python and Next Steps. This enables students to access the Cambridge National in Creative iMedia course offered at Key Stage 4 where students learn about the media industry, identity and digital graphics and digital interactive media.

Business

In Key Stage 4 Business students in Year 10 are studying the Cambridge National in Enterprise and Marketing course. Students learn about enterprise and marketing concepts, how to design a business proposal and how to market and pitch a business proposal. In Year 11 students are following the GCSE Business course learning about production processes, quality of goods and services, sales

process and customer services, consumer law, business location, working with suppliers, the role of the finance function, sources of finance, revenue, costs, profit and loss, cash flow, ethical and environmental considerations and the economic climate.













Health and Social Care

In Key Stage 4 Health and Social Care students are studying the Cambridge National in Health and Social Care course. In Year 10 students are learning about the principles of care in health and social care settings and starting their first coursework unit on supporting individuals through life events.

Year 11 are working on their heath promotion campaigns coursework unit and will then be revisiting their work on the principles of care in health and social care settings.

Humanities

The Humanities Faculty wish to extend a huge welcome to our new Year 7 students who have made a fantastic start to their studies in History, Geography and RE at The Oaks Academy. We would also like to take this opportunity to welcome the newest members of our team; Miss Emma Lavens and Mr Liam Kirk- Porter who will be teaching Geography and RE to our KS3 and KS4 students.

Year 7 students will begin their studies looking at an Introduction to six key Religions before focussing on the Jewish Faith. In History, students will develop their understanding of the Romans and how their empire was able to expand so far. In Geography, students will explore the continent of Africa through its different environments, animals and peoples before studying the country of Kenya in detail.

We are also thrilled to welcome back our Year 8, 9, 10 and 11 students.

Our Year 8 students will begin their History studies this year by looking at the Tudors and the role that religion played on the power and politics of the period. In Religious studies students will examine the early life of Buddha and his teachings about life. In Geography students will look in depth at the Geography of Disease and the role that wealth plays on global health.

Year 9 students in History will discover how the British came to control twenty five percent of the world and the role that the slave trade played in the British Empire. As the end approaches on our first half term of the 2023/24 academic year, it has been a fantastic 7 weeks. September saw us welcome 147 new year 7s into The Oaks Academy. The year 7 cohort have settled very well and are now much more confident in their ways. National Average for attendance is 93.1% across the country, and I am pleased to say that in Key stage 3 we are sitting above that figure at 93.8%. With many pupils maintaining 100% in the first 7 weeks we understandably have faced the back to school bugs, and the new variant of COVID. It is important to remind you, If your child is well enough we will warmly welcome them into school.

Throughout the school day form tutors and teachers rewards positive contributions with achievements points. This can be for a range of things. Across the three-year groups a staggering 21,521 positive achievement points have been awarded. This is incredible! Year 7 have pipped year 9 in the ratings with 7687 point compared to 7466 and 6368 in year 8. Contributing to these amazing

achievements 3 pupils who lead the way across key stage 3 and within their year groups. A big well done to Sophie W in year 7, with 128 achievement points, Phoebe S with 99 achievement points and Logan G in year 9 with 122 points.

With the introduction of our new house system at The Oaks Academy this year it is interesting to see who is going above and beyond school life. 7 Webb have topped the achievement in year 7 with a phenomenal 2201 achievement points, this is 1054 points ahead of 7 Claughton! Year 8 saw a close competition with 8 Claughton seeking victory from 8 Gresley by 28 points, with a total of 1217 achievement points. Finally in year 9 saw Claughton victorious again with 1786 achievement points, a fantastic 418 ahead of 9 Hardwicke.










Key Stage 4 Update
