# Year 1



We used our experience from the trip to help us with our leaflet writing in English. The children were to write a persuasive leaflet encouraging others to go and visit Bournemouth









# Year 2

In English this half term, we have been learning about fables and leaflets. The children had a chance to write their very own fable and create a leaflet for their own event!







In Maths, we have been focusing on statistics, position and direction and learning new written methods for addition and subtraction. Everyone enjoyed all the practical ways we learnt these new concepts!

In Science, Year 2 have been focusing on the topic Living Things and Their Habitats, focusing on minibeasts and microhabitats. The children have been learning lots of new vocabulary, as well as exploring the microhabitats around school







In Art, Year 2 have been focusing on making clay pots! We learnt the history behind clay pots, and different techniques used to make them. The children then had a go at molding, painting and glazing their own pots to use at home.







The highlight of the half term was our trip to Beale Wildlife Park! The children saw some amazing animals, rode the train and even touched a real life python in our African Savannah workshop. All of the children said it was the best day ever!











# Year 3

We have had a fantastic term in Year 3! I think it's safe to say the highlight of the term has been our horse-riding sessions at Palmer Stables. Each and every child showed bravery, resilience, respect and responsibility during these trips and we are all very proud!



In history, we have been learning all about the Ancient Egyptians! Did you know King Tut was only about 9 years old when he became the king of Egypt?!

We had lots of fun finding artefacts in our archaeological dig, exploring tombs, mummifying ourselves and learning to write in hieroglyphics. We have been getting creative in design technology by planning, designing and evaluating our very own car designs. We began by looking at the first cars (or automobiles!) ever invented and were amazing they didn't even have a roof. We have worked collaboratively during this topic and built on our team work skills.









We also got to have a movie afternoon as a reward for our 100% attendance. We watched Inside Out and had popcorn!


All of the Year 3 teachers and staff would like to say a huge well done to Year 3 for a fantastic year. Have a lovely break and we can't wait to see you again in September!





## Year 4






This term in Maths, Year 4 students have made remarkable strides in their learning and understanding of various concepts. They have explored geometric shapes by investigating the properties of different angles and practicing translating shapes on a grid with great precision. In addition to their work with shapes and coordinates, the students also delved into the practical use of clocks, developing a solid grasp of how to tell the time accurately. This hands-on experience was key in reinforcing their understanding of time in everyday contexts. Furthermore, Year 4 revisited and applied their knowledge of decimals, particularly in the context of calculating money. This exercise not only helped their decimal skills but also provided them with valuable real-world scenarios of their mathematical learning. Overall, Year 4 have demonstrated enthusiasm in their Maths studies, showcasing their ability to tackle a variety of mathematical challenges with confidence and skill!

This term in Design and Technology, Year 4 have embarked on an exciting journey to discover how greenhouses work and how they help plants grow, linking to their Science studies on Living Things. The students explored the theory behind greenhouses and their role in providing an optimal environment for plant growth. Putting their knowledge into practice, the children demonstrated creativity and teamwork by constructing their own mini greenhouses using lollipop sticks and plastic film. This hands-on project allowed them to apply their understanding and see firsthand how greenhouses can support plant life. Year 4 have shown impressive creativity and enthusiasm in their Design and Technology unit, deepening their

understanding of the natural world while honing their





















### Science

### **English**

The children have impressed with their writing this half term, where the focus has been on writing adventure narratives, persuasive letters and origin stories. When writing, the children have made a real effort to include more adventurous vocabulary to enrich their writing. A particular area of study the children excelled at was how to create tension and suspense when writing adventure narratives to allow their reader to feel unsure and anxious about what was going to happen next. Well done, Year 4

### **History**

Vikings has been the focus this half term in History, and the children have been fascinated with this group of fearless invaders! The children have learnt all about where the Vikings originally came from before invading Britain and the reasons for doing so; including the Vikings

desire to steal all the precious gold from Britain! To enhance our learning, we invited a company called Portals to the Past to deliver an entertaining workshop all about the Vikings. We learnt how to play a traditional Viking games called 'Fox and Geese', we learnt about their everyday life by looking at artefacts and we also watched an enthralling demonstration showing us how effective Viking armour was.









# Year 5

Year 5 have had a brilliant end to the year – we are so proud of everything they have achieved.

In our reading lessons this term, Year 5 have enjoyed reading Wonder. We used lots of different comprehension skills, such us vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval and summarising, to help us have a deep understanding of the text. We are looking forward to next week when we will be watching the film and comparing it to the book.

In DT, we have been making cam toys. This has been a challenging mechanism to get right and the children were so resilient throughout the process. They've made some very cool toys!

In our history lessons, we have been fascinated by the industrial revolution. We were especially interested when we learnt about the children who had to work in dangerous conditions during this period. Throughout this topic, the children have worked hard on different projects demonstrating what they've learnt. We've made PowerPoints, posters, plays and pieces of charcoal art inspired by the industrial revolution.

In computing, we have broadened our understanding of programming from block-based programming (using Scratch) to text-based programming (using J2Code Logo). The children have enjoyed using text-based programming to draw repeating patterns using polygons and rotations. We really enjoyed looking at each other's patterns, being inspired to try different methods ourselves.



# Year 6

Wow! What an end to the term and to our time here at The Palmer Academy. Summer 2 is always busy but, for Year 6, it is just that little bit busier. With many different events to celebrate our time here and visitors to support our transition there has always been something going on.

### **Worry Warriors**

You may have had your children come home and teach you some breathing methods for relaxation or self-regulation. Sophie (from the Mental Health Support Team) visited Year 6 for four weeks to complete some work around transition into secondary school. They discussed worries about changes and ways to adapt our thinking in order to be more positive about the upcoming changes







### Maths

In Maths this half term, we have been preparing ourselves for secondary school by looking at timetables and understanding how to use them in order to get to the right places. We have worked on Ratio where we used our knowledge of fractions and times tables to support us in our learning and we have also completed some work with calculators. We have continued to take pride in the work we have completed and have enjoyed working more collaboratively in class too.

### **English**

This half term, we have completed our balanced arguments on whether or not school uniform should be compulsory for school-aged children and have looked at a short video called 'Alma' as inspiration for our own narratives. This has been a chance for us to practice all the skills we have learned and has allowed for really descriptive pieces to be written. Of course, we have also spent some time reflecting on our memories of the time we have spent at The Palmer Academy and have written some poems. We will have shared some of these at the Year 6 Leavers' Assembly.

### <u>History</u>

In History we have learned everything about Reading during World War Two. Using a website designed by the teachers, we carried out research on the town of Reading and its role in war, as well as learned about the shift in the role of women and different memorials around town. We were delighted to take part in an "Evacuee Experience" workshop delivered by Philippa, member of the Museum of English Rural Life in Reading. We have really enjoyed learning more about our area and history.

### **Book presentation**

Daphne Barnes, a previous student from The Palmer Academy (when it was George Palmer School) has worked alongside other alumni to create a photo book on the history of The Palmer Academy which are sponsored by them along with school staff and is gifted to every Year 6 pupil each year. Daphne gave an informative presentation on the school and shared information about some of the sponsors who were there – sharing some stories of their experiences at school. The children shared a couple of songs from their production and enjoyed looking through their books together





### Wicked

Year 6 were 'Culture Vultures' (one of our 11B411 promises) last Wednesday when they visited London to watch the West End show WICKED. We travelled by train and enjoyed a picnic in the park before the performance. The children had so much fun and will definitely remember this day for years to come.

All children were invited to audition for the show and performed in class where their peers voted for their favorite performances. ### Please ensure your child has the proper school uniform

Our uniform, worn by all the children, is a distinctive feature of The Palmer Academy. ### Boys

- Grey or black trousers or shorts
- Plain grey, white or black socks
- Black leather shoes (no boots, trainers or sandals to be worn)

### Girls

- School jumper or cardigan with or without a logo-no hoodies
- White shirt or white polo shirt
- Grey or black trousers, shorts, skirt, or dress
- Plain grey, white, or black socks or tights
- Black leather shoes (no boots, trainers, high heels, open toed shoes or sandals to be worn)

### Physical Education Kit

- · Black shorts or track suit bottoms
- School house P.E. T-shirt or plain white shirt
- School logo/Plain black hoodie or plain black tracksuit top
- Trainers
- No branded Tracksuits

### **Hair and Jewellery**

- Hair should be natural in colour and for health and safety reasons, long hair must be tied back with ,hair ties, clips or bands of school colours (Burgundy/maroon, grey,white,black,and blue)
- For health and safety reasons, earrings cannot be worn during PE. Children will need to be able to remove and put earrings back themselves. We only allow stud earrings which are not dangling.

Please make sure items are clearly labelled with your child's name, including coats, hats, and scarves.

Teachers will discuss any issues with uniform with parents/carers and ask them to support the school by arranging for the correct uniform to be worn within a reasonable timeframe. Pupils without the correct PE kit will not be permitted to take part in physical activity. If your child can not meet our uniform requirements, please get in touch to organise a meeting with a member of SLT so we can support you. If your child needs a change in uniform due to a medical need you will need to contact the school to set up a medical plan using doctors advice and evidence, Any questions please contact- Thank you for your help in ensuring all our children wear the correct uniform




