<u>Attendance</u>

Now that we are back at school, it's really important that the children make every opportunity to make use of their learning time, and not miss any further school unless there is an exceptional circumstance or illness. Naturally, if your child is displaying any of the COVID symptoms (e.g. high-temperate, new cough etc.) then they should be kept home until a test can be booked and taken, but for most other minor ailments, children should continue to come to school. If you are ever unsure, please do just ask us – we can let you know if you should book at test or whether your child is safe to come to school.

Please also be aware that any requests for holidays during term-time are generally not exceptional, and as a such will not be authorised and parents/carers will likely receive a fixed-penalty notice and fine from Reading Borough Council for taking their child out of school unnecessarily. As a reminder, under the current national laws, travelling abroad (unless for the permitted reasons) is illegal and children should not be being taken out of school unnecessarily.


The Parts of a Parent Reader

What have Nursery been learning about this week?

This week in Nursery we have been learning about the butterfly lifecycle, we have been lucky enough to watch the caterpillars grow bigger, turn to chrysalises, and then hatch out as orange butterflies.

We are continuing to learn about Plants in Science and we began our week with a wonderful lesson in the sunshine exploring trees in our school environment. In English, we have started learning to write our news articles about the Ant and the Grasshopper. In history we have continued our unit on Explorers by learning about life in the 1960's and in Maths we have continued our unit on Measurement, this week learning to compare mass using the terms lighter and heavier. In our final week of the Spring Term we will finish our Reading unit on The Gruffalo. 


