
### What have Reception been learning about this week?

It was a successful 'hunt', finding worms, scorpions, a spider, earthworms and a ladybird. Afterwards Giles showed the children how he carefully released their 'catch'. An outside experience enjoyed by all.





### What have Year Two been learning about this week?



We have had a great start to Year 2 this year. The children have come back ready to learn and have remembered so much. We are enjoying writing our own versions of Paddington Bear. We are also counting in 2s, 5s and 10s



so keep practising at home too. In geography we have been learning

about London. We have been exploring the landmarks, reading maps and have created our own riddles. Can you guess which landmarks we are describing in our riddles?

### What have Year Four been learning about this week?

It has been a busy start for year four this term. We have been learning about place value in maths and have been exploring numbers up to 10 000 and counting in negative numbers. We have loved reading and have enjoyed exploring new words and characters in the books, 'Why the whales Came' and 'Claude'. Our English lessons have been filled with descriptive writing and we are learning how we can be more creative in our writing by using expanded noun phrases, adverbs and similes.



In the afternoons, we have loved learning about out different

topic subjects. In Geography, we have learnt about the different animals and the layers of plant life in the rainforests. In Science, we have loved exploring the different sounds in the environment and conducted experiments to see how far sound can travel. RE has taken us on a journey, learning about Islamic weddings and birth ceremonies. We have all really enjoyed learning this term and are looking forward to learning even more!

# What have Year Six been learning about this week?



Year 6's overarching topic this term is 'North America' and so in Geography we have been completing some map work to show that we can locate the different countries. We have also researched a little more about our choice of capital cities and have created fact files on the places we would like to visit.





In our Light topic, we created periscopes and became scientists: we investigated how shadows change when we moved an item closer/further away from a light source. We enjoyed working collaboratively and discussing how to make it a reliable and fair test.









English has been just as exciting! We've been learning a model text and practicing key features before writing our very own descriptions. Next week we are writing an 'Escape' narrative. Here is a sneak-peak at some of the writing we've already completed that might appear in our final pieces. Notice how we've been editing as we go to make sure we are proud of the writing we turn in to our teachers.

### Parent Governor Nomination

We are pleased to announce that Mrs. Smitha Jayakumar put herself forward for the role of Parent Governor as part of the Local Governing Body at The Palmer Academy and has been duly 'elected' as Parent Governor to represent the parent/carer body, alongside existing Parent Governor, Mr. Michael Halliday. The Local Governing Body will meet next week for the first time this term and are looking forward to having an additional Parent Governor to support them in this vital role.

### Lockdown practice

The safety and welfare of our pupils and staff are our highest priority at Palmer. We practice safety drills throughout the year to help our children know what to do in an emergency. We have already conducted a fire evacuation which was successful and new children to the academy now know what to do when they hear an alarm and how to exit the building quickly and safely.

Next Wednesday we will be conducting a lockdown drill. A 'lockdown' procedure may be activated in response to any number of situations at the academy but some of the more typical might be:

- A reported incident/civil disturbance in the local community (with the potential to pose a risk to staff and children in the academy);
- An intruder on the school site (with the potential to pose a risk to staff and children);
- A warning being received regarding a risk locally, of air pollution (smoke plume, gas cloud etc.); or
- A major fire in the vicinity of the school.

The goals of the drills are to improve our ability to protect children, save lives and reduce injuries. These practice drills allow us to evaluate our emergency operation plans and improve our response skills. Whilst we would not ordinarily notify you of such drills, as this is the first one your child may have experienced, we wanted you to be aware. You would normally only be notified if there were a real emergency.

The academy will conduct one lockdown drill each term. In this type of drill, we will secure the school building and safely shelter all children, staff and visitors inside the building. The purpose of this drill is to keep the children safe from any danger outside or inside the school building. During a lockdown drill all of the perimeter doors to the school building will be locked and will remain locked until the danger or issue outside or inside the building is removed. To enable everyone to remain safe, no one will be allowed to enter or leave the building until myself or a member of the Senior Leadership Team authorises such a release.

We prepare the children for such drills in an age-appropriate way – so for our youngest of children, we may talk with them about what were to happen if perhaps there was an animal that had escaped that could be dangerous. Therefore, if you hear your child coming home next Wednesday saying that a lion was on the loose, then please do not be alarmed!
