3. Scarlett has multiplied the numerator by 3 and the denominator by 2. Both numbers need to be multiplied by either 2 or 3 as the same needs to be done to both the numerator and the denominator.

6. Robert has not multiplied the numerators and denominators to find the equivalent fractions, he has added. He should have multiplied the numerator and denominator of the first fraction by 3 and the second fraction by 6 to find the equivalent fractions.

8. Various answers, for example:

A. $\frac{25}{30} = \frac{10}{12} = \frac{15}{18} = \frac{5}{6}$; B. $\frac{6}{10} = \frac{12}{20} = \frac{21}{35} = \frac{3}{5}$; C. $\frac{2}{7} = \frac{6}{21} = \frac{4}{14} = \frac{8}{28}$; D. $\frac{7}{12} = \frac{49}{84} = \frac{28}{48} = \frac{21}{36}$

9. Chloe has incorrectly multiplied 18 by 4, the denominator should be 72 not 54. For the second set of fractions, she has subtracted 36 from the denominator and the numerator, rather than dividing both by the same number.
