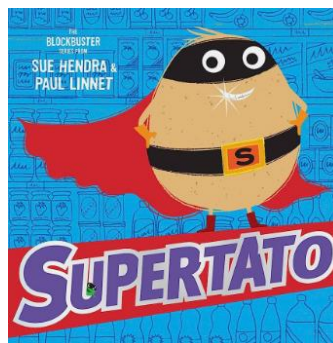




Meet our brilliant author and illustrator...

How do brilliant writers use the conjunctions and, because and but?

Conjunctions join together two different, but related, parts of a sentence. They can be words like: **and**, **but**, **because**. We will focus on using 'and' initially.

How do brilliant writers add -ed endings?

We will be reading words ending in the suffix -ed. We will begin by looking at words where we can simply add -ed onto the end. We will also spell these words. Whilst reading we will identify that different spelling rules are used depending on the root word.

conjunction	A word that joins words or clauses in a sentence together
plural	More than one of something
