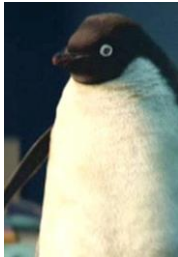




Meet our brilliant visual piece...

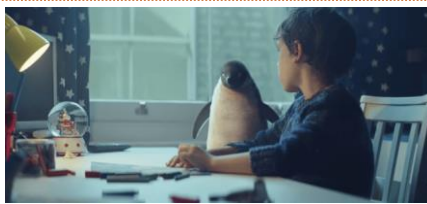
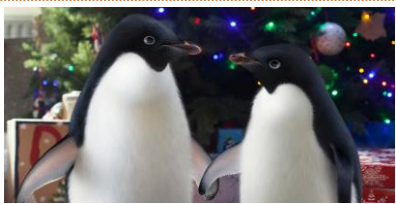

We will explore this vocabulary in class to use in our writing.

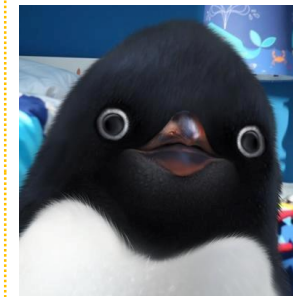

How do brilliant writers use features of persuasive writing?

Repeated words draws attention to important words or ideas	Emotive language words to make the reader have strong feelings.	Humour make funny points and jokes.
Alliteration when 2 or more words that start with the same sound are used	Personal pronouns: This is where the writer will use pronouns such as, 'I,' 'we,' or 'you' to talk directly to the reader.

Key vocabulary: Glossary

adverb	A word that describes a verb (an action or a doing word). E.g. He ate his breakfast <u>quickly</u> . Adverbs can come before or after a verb. E.g. He 'quickly' ate his lunch or he ate his lunch 'quickly'.
comma	A punctuation mark that helps to make meaning clear by separating words, phrases or clauses in a sentence. E.g. big, red house
expanded noun phrase	Expanded noun phrases add more detail to the noun by adding one or more adjectives . An adjective is a word that describes a noun. For example: a <u>huge</u> tree, some <u>colourful</u> sweets, the <u>large, royal</u> castle
persuasive writing	A form of non-fiction writing that is written to persuade a reader of a belief, opinion or idea.
subordination	A conjunction is a word, or words, used to connect two clauses together. Words such as: 'because' or 'when' A subordinating clause is a part of a sentence that adds additional information to the main clause. A subordinating conjunction is simply the word/words that is used to join a subordinating clause to another clause or sentence.
