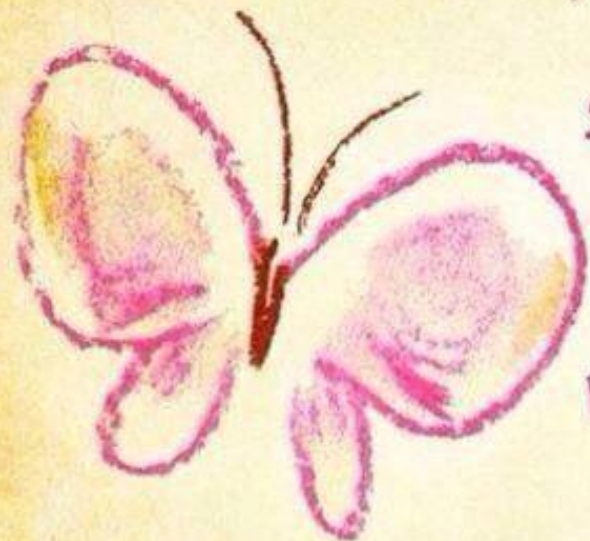

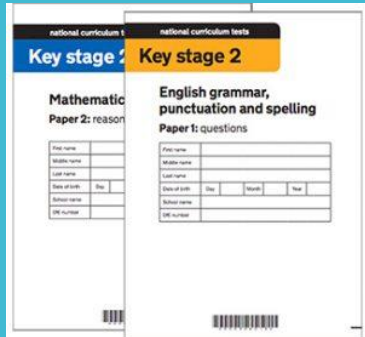

What are SATs?



When are they?

- Standard Assessment Test - **compulsory** for all 11-year olds in England.
- A **measure of a child's educational achievement** to help hold schools to account for the attainment of their pupils and the progress they make.
- We will provide the pupils with **breakfast** at 8.30am each morning of SATs week.
- Other subjects, including **Writing**, are teacher assessed. A teacher assessment is made based over this academic year.
- Parents and carers will be informed of **results** in July 2026 along with their child's end of year report.

A measure of a child's educational achievement to help hold schools to account for the attainment of their pupils and the progress they make.

- Understanding of exam conditions and time pressures.
- Reducing worries around exams in the future.
- Recognising importance of self-study (revision and homework).
- Encouraging small steps of progress over time.
- Improving resilience for adulthood.

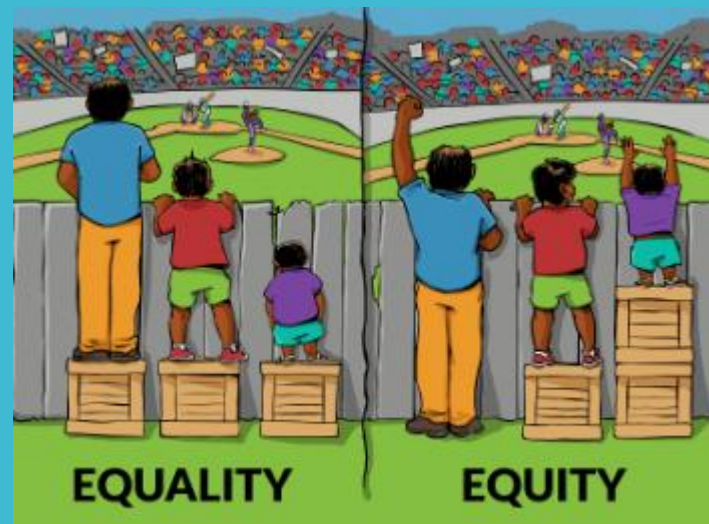

Wednesday 13 May 2026	Mathematics Papers 1 and 2
Thursday 14 May 2026	Mathematics Paper 3

Access Arrangements



Many of your children have extra provision in school for them to reach their full potential. Where possible, this will continue during SATs tests.

We must **apply** for access arrangements and **provide evidence** for why they might be needed. These requests need to be made by February 2026.

Possible Support

- 1:1 reader – an adult will be sat beside your child, but not for the reading test.
- Extra time – any child with an EHCP automatically qualifies for 25% extra time.

A child cannot have a reader and extra time. Only one is permitted.

- Transcriber – an adult will transcribe small parts of a child's test after completion.

Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPaG)

- Paper 1: Grammar and punctuation paper requiring short answers (45 mins – 50 marks)
- Paper 2: Spelling test of 20 words (15 mins – 20 marks)

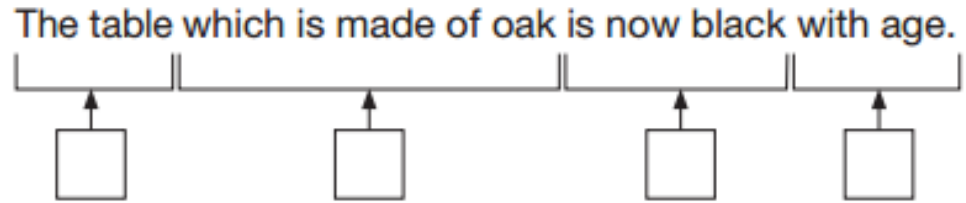

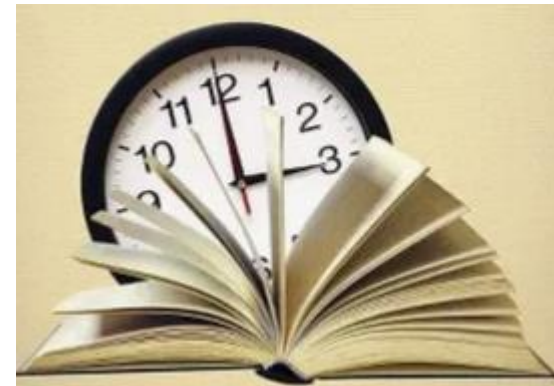

Topics

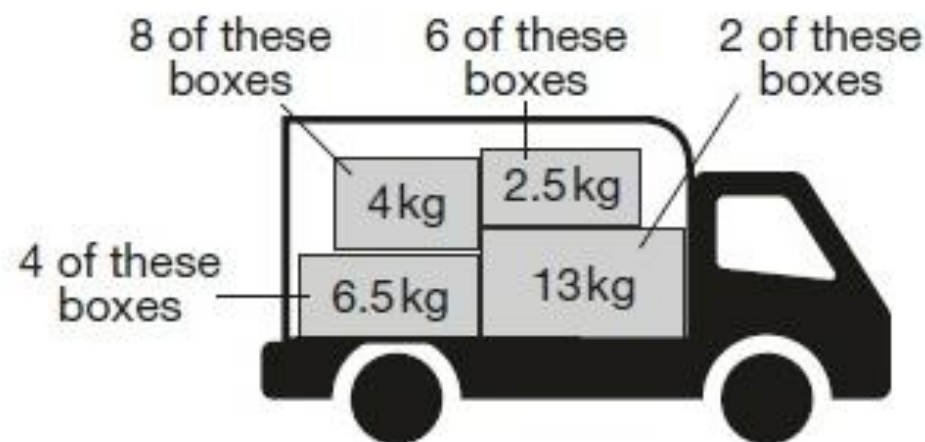

How can you help?

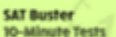
- Making sure your children have **good routines at home** with regards to sleep and breakfast.
- Making sure your children arrive to school **on time** as well as **being in school every day**, unless very ill. This includes being in for every test, despite illness – this may affect provision for them.
- **Listen to your child read** as much as possible to help with their reading speed.
- **Helping your child to plan** out when they are going to do their homework and revision.

FAQs

Where will SATs tests take place in school?

Most children will be in their classrooms, but some children may be in other areas of the school. We will be using the school hall, lodge, library, work rooms and pastoral rooms. All tests will be administered by Year 6 teachers or other adults known by the children.

At what time in the school day will SATs tests take place?

All tests will be completed in the morning of each day with a high chance of them being completed by break time.

What about Writing?

Writing is teacher assessed. Dorset Local Authority moderate our teacher judgements on writing every few years. Year 6 teachers attend moderation meetings with other schools throughout the year for writing.

What level should my child reach?

National Standard by the end of Year 6. This reflects where the Department for Education thinks children should be. The National Standard score will not be released until after the SATs have taken place but nationally last year 61% of pupils reached the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths. Children will get a scaled score from 80-120 for each test. 100 is normally the expected standard (EXS). Anything below 100 will be classes as working below the expected standard (BLW/WTS). 110 or above is normally the working at greater depth (GDS) score.

When will I get my child's results?

All tests are externally marked. Results are received by schools in July and we will give these to individual pupils.
