Key achievements to date:

- Gaining engagement (continuation of silver) award standard in School Games award in 2024/25.
- Gained The Great Active Sunderland School Charter Award (Gold level 2024-25)
- Curriculum rewritten to ensure breadth and depth of learning, focusing on developing the key skills in KS1 and progressing to a range of different sports in KS2.
- Sports Day adapted to include a range of competitive elements, linked to the key skills in the new curriculum.
- Reception children took part in Dance REunited class dance competition in Spring Term.
- Profile of PE raised within school, including sporting achievements and OAA displays.
- Increase in accuracy of PE assessment (this has led to a drop in results but the accuracy of them will enable staff to plug gaps and ensure progress better)
- Progression and assessment documents created to support staff to accurately assess children across the school and tailor lessons according to children's needs. Staff utilising these in lessons
- Play time sporting provisions reviewed and new equipment purchased, increasing the number of children active during these times in KS1 and KS2, evidenced in RISE assessment
- Wider range of sports coaches involved with school with many taster sessions offered from local clubs.
- Y5 Sports leaders running and maintaining active sports in lower year groups at play and lunch times.
- Children's active time monitored and used to assess who attends intra-school competitions.
- Wider range of sports competitions and coaches for SEND children.
- More inter school competitions entered than previous years.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Consider working with Sunderland SSP to reduce transport costs and distances to events and look at comparative cost of coaches into school. Their offer also includes guaranteed sports leader programme and midday supervisor training, which are areas we really want to develop this year.
- New wave of sports leaders trained and utilised to increase range and participation in active play during breaktimes as well as to maintain and look after sports equipment.
- Look into ways intra-house competitions can be incorporated into timetable and curriculum to provide more access to competitive sport.
- Continue to monitor assessment of children across school to ensure it is accurate. Triangulate data on Arbor with teacher assessment folders. However data now suggests that assessment is more accurate
- See how RISE suggestions can be incorporated further into our curriculum/timetable.
- New playtime equipment purchased and planed as part of a carousel on 3 playgrounds.
- New Y6 children (current Y5's) taught to count/monitor if equipment is being looked after.
- Better maintained storage for playtime equipment.
- Inclusion Lead look into cost/benefit of opal play

Barriers to Learning	
A	Social Deprivation: According to IDACI, 60% of our children live in the bottom 10% of the most deprived areas nationally, 76% in the bottom 20%, 80% in the bottom 30%, 84% in the bottom 40% and 95% in the bottom 50%. IDACI data over time shows an increasing trend in income deprivation in all the above categories for our pupils and their families. This affects the level of engagement in sporting activities outside of school due to the lack of funds to spend on such activities for a sustained period.
B	Lack of activity outside of school: A large number of children (60%+) participate in little or no physical activity outside of the school day
C	Attainment on entry: Physical development on entry to school continue to be significantly lower than what would be regarded as typical for many children of a similar age.
D	Social Care Needs: Our school has a large number of children (40%) who have been supported historically or currently by outside agencies including social care and family support workers. These families are exposed to the wide range of risk factors that affect health, family unit, prosperity.

(50% of total cost) £2500 for equipment for playtimes.	• This year we have had a number of after school clubs, including outdoor coaches that have been well taken up, with both Foundation of light, Gateshead SSP and Washington Athletic providing coaches. • The relationship with Washington Athletic continues to grow with after school clubs, sharing use of the hall for awards ceremonies and support for sports day. • All children have been offered the 2hours of PE each week. The lack of hall space has hampered this. The active playtimes have been successful although the nature garden being out of use and the equipment not being well cared for have been issues. • Intra school competitions have been hard to implement this year due to timetable constraints and PE lead breaking his foot and being off school for a period of time. • Child-led games have been implemented lunchtimes but lunchtime staff participation training needs renewing. • Physical breaks in lessons have been happening regularly across the year groups, particularly lower down the school. • The minibus has been used regularly and allowed us to enter many competitions across all 3	Next year look to move to Sunderland SSP as they have guaranteed access to the sports leader’s course and have days where activities are brought into school for intra school as well as inter school competitions. Continue to hire the minibuses as it enables us to enter more sporting competitions. Use funding to purchase more playtime equipment to be run on a carousel rota to increase engagement and care of equipment as per RISE recommendations. Continue to work with Washington Athletic as this is providing great access to physical activity for the children and improves the running of sports day and the football teams. Change organisation of playtimes (2 year groups on a yard at playtimes) to enable more staff present to supervising active play alongside the sports leaders.

Continue systems for celebrating sporting activities as it has raised the profile of PE and sport across the school. With the potential of more teacher-led sporting activities at play times, this should help raise the profile further. Sports leaders are given apparel to wear under Sunderland SSP and this will help raise the profile of sports leaders and sport in general. No massive changes needed to sports day as it has run well for past few years and is allowing children to showcase the skills they have learnt through the new PE scheme.

Purchase of scheme £500	• Gateshead SSP were great for providing a great range of sporting competitions and network opportunities. The distance to some events was more challenging with staffing issues (drivers and staff attending). • Lesson observations show staff are using the new scheme well. CPD through one-to-one conversations was offered to a number of staff that needed support but staff in general seemed confident using the scheme which is having an effect on improving the skills and understanding of children. • Assessment folders largely being used to good effect. Where it wasn't being used well, guidance was offered to ensure assessments were accurate. • Data shows a far greater percentage of children meeting expected standard showing that the basic skills are coming through stronger. There is also less GD children, particularly lower down the school, suggesting that staff are thinking more carefully about whether children are actually GD or just good at football, for instance. • Staff survey and pupil voice hampered by PE lead breaking foot and other PE lead on maternity and will need to be completed in the autumn term next year. • New guidance suggests that next	Next year consider Sunderland SSP instead of Gateshead to reduce travel and strain on drivers. Also, their CPD offer looks more aligned to what we need. Continue to monitor assessment – particularly end of year data and compare to assessment folders to ensure they match up. Offer guidance to any staff who may still need support. Staff survey and pupil voice to be conducted in Autumn term to suggest any changes/need for CPD etc. in PE. Evaluate how change in PE and sport guidance from government affects relationships with secondary schools and assess opportunities to build links there.

Also see funding from Key indicator 1.	Taster sessions offered in rugby and tae kwondo this year. The children thoroughly enjoyed these, and we need to look to expand this next year. Children were active at play and lunchtimes but the equipment was not looked after and this tailed off towards the end of the year. The sports leaders also became a little disillusioned after a while as they needed support to manage younger children's behaviour. Children who were not accessing sport outside of schools were targeted and this was very successful in ensuring as wide a range as possible of children could access sport. Relationships with sports clubs is growing but not as many as we would like at the moment. This is something to continue developing for next year.	Continue to develop more links with local clubs, offering advertising on the newsletter and flier space in the school reception. Also try to incorporate more taster sessions as they were very successful. New funding for PE equipment will be used on a carousel plan to increase engagement and care taken of equipment. More staff on yards will enable them to lead active play alongside the sports leaders. The system of allocating places and letters being created at the start of each half term was very successful and led to more trips being accessed. The girl's football team was incredibly successful winning two competitions this year. All TAs and some key staff are now first aid trained No new staff have been or minibus trained as of yet.	Continue to enter sporting competitions as we were but look to Sunderland for provision as this should mean less travel and less strain on drivers. Continue the method of letter and admin writing for sports events as it has been relatively successful. If funding allows, train more minibus drivers. Continue to push the development of the girl's football team and build on this year's success. Try to get more visitors in through building more links with local sports clubs.
