Sport Premium Impact Statement 2024-25

External Category		
Area	Amount Spent	Impact
Inter-School Sports Competitions	£360	Once again this year, the school fielded both boys' and girls' teams from Years 3 – 6 in the Bromley School's Cross Country meetings. Through the continual promotion of the weekly running club at school, Valley had the highest number of runners participating in this sporting event this year compared to previous years.
Activities Organised by School Games Organisers	£750	Valley Primary School competed in a number of different events this year including its first-ever specific SEND sporting competition. Pupils participated in the following sporting events / competitions: Football, Netball Rugby, Athletics, Swimming. The school's tag-rugby team won the Bromley competition and went on to represent the borough in the London Youth Games finishing in 9 th place out of 19 boroughs.
External Coaching	£240	The Palace Foundation delivered specific coaching to pupils with SEND. The impact seen was the full participation of all chosen pupils and 82% showed increased levels of self-esteem, confidence and enjoyment in all aspects of school life. There has also been improved support for these pupils from their ISAs in their mainstream PE lessons as a result of the strategies modelled by the coach in the weekly sessions.
Membership Fees	£219	Membership to Association of Physical Education (AfPE) has allowed PE Leads to keep abreast of latest thinking and research in relation to high-quality physical education. In addition to this, PE Leads have shared training and resources published on the AfPE members' area with all staff during CPD staff meeting sessions.
Educational Platforms	£3,049.20	Part-funding of My Happy Mind to improve the mental health and wellbeing of all pupils. As a result of initiating this project, pupils are becoming more regulated due to their deepening understanding of how their brain works. A further impact of this work has been a reduction in the number of girl school refusers in academic year 2024-25 with no girl showing heightened anxiety of separating from a parent in the morning and refusing to come to school. 234 Pupils participated in extra-curricular sporting activity in the last academic year which is a 12% increase on the previous year. All Year 6 pupils stated they felt happy and confident ahead of their transition to secondary school following the completion of the transition module from My Happy Mind.

School-Based Extra-Curricular	£326.88	The purchase of further OPAL equipment has support an increase in more physical activity at playtimes and lunchtimes. Pupils have engaged in physical play through the loose parts play building various structures and designs. Pupils have also accessed daily dance sessions at lunchtimes and by purchasing a new set of balls, pupils have engaged in Four Square and Basketball play during their break times.
Internal Sports Competitions	£272.82	The purchase of additional equipment for the annual Key Stage 2 sports day supported a newly-introduced format to this event which mirrors the format of Key Stage 1. The impact of this spending was a more inclusive sports day allowing every pupil in Key Stage 2 to participate in all events. The school did not receive one parental complaint this year that their child only participated in a limited number of events.

Equipment & Resources	£8,725.33	As a result of the spend in this area, all pupils, including those in Pre-School, have had access to high quality resources to use in their PE lessons and as part of the physical development aspects of learning within the Early Years. Investment was also made in equipment to develop core skills of co-ordination and throwing and catching and, as a result, over 85% of pupils in each year met the expected standard in physical education for their age group. Within this spend, more robust goal posts and basketball hoops were purchased which now offer longevity and has increased sustained participation in physical activity during playtimes and lunchtimes.
CPD Category		
Internal Learning & Development	£2835	All staff, including those in Pre-School, have received training and support on different modules in the school's PE scheme. Staff meeting time was also allocated to allow staff to further explore the different resources found within the school scheme. As part of the training, there was also a focus on physical development and developing core sporting skills within the Early Years and the delivery of outdoor and adventurous activities. AS a result of this investment, the pupils have received a more varied programme of physical education learning in academic year 2024-25 and 100% of staff report increased levels of confidence in teaching the full spectrum of lessons found in the whole-school scheme.
Online Training & Resource Development	£385	Purchase of the whole-school PE scheme has ensure a spiral curriculum is offered in this subject with core skills and knowledge incrementally building over time. Clear progression can be seen in the pupils' ability to perform specific sporting skills and pupils also become more competent in teamwork, strategy and personal performance.
