Update from Assistant Head Teacher

Wow what a term! With our ever-growing intake of pupils and, of course our success rate at returning pupils to mainstream school, a huge congratulations should be given not only to our pupils but also to our highly



committed and hardworking Team.

Our Attendance rate still surpasses the National PRU average by over 10%, and it is 5% higher than this time last year. Currently, we have 103 pupils enrolled, and we are continuously seeking enriching activities that will help enhance pupils' social and emotional wellbeing while supporting them in developing resilience, relationships and emotional control.

During this Summer term alone, we have had the pleasure of experiencing a wide range of activities, including Base Jump, Garon's Golf, weekly sessions at Southend Combat, Stubbers, Just Ride, visits to local parks, a fire truck tour, See The Signs, President's Sport Day, trips to Southend Pier and local beaches, Adventure Island, Odeon Cinema, B&Q, Pets at Home, Priory Park, Nuclear Races, Hopefield's Animal Sanctuary, Exotic Explorers, Hadleigh Farm/Café for careers exploration, and a visit from the school Nurse for careers guidance, along with Mr Packer's story time..

The last two weeks of term will be focused on preparing the pupils to stay safe during the summer break while offering some wonderful enrichment activities. The pupils have played a significant role in selecting these activities, which include Sports Day,

rounders at the park involving all staff, Tutor Trips, Arts and Crafts sessions, Bake Offs, and Healing and Meditation.

primary team and pupils enjoy spending time with him during their learning. Fudge also enjoys lots of strokes and cuddles. During maths pupils have enjoyed learning about weight and estimating the weight of objects before using scales to measure them accurately. During English

What are the benefits of having a School Well-Being Dog?


There are many benefits to having a well-being dog in an alternative school setting, the main one being the health and wellbeing of both pupils



and staff alike. A dog has an immediate calming effect by just being nearby.

Many pupils and staff will pop in just to see him and pupils have admitted he has cheered them up with his calm, affectionate and very gentle nature.

Teddy worked hard reducing some year 11 pupils'



exam anxiety and his presence has a soothing effect for pupils in primary, pupils with sensory needs or across secondary.

The role of wellbeing dogs is to react and respond to people and their

environment, under the guidance and direction of their handler. For example, an individual might be encouraged to gently pat or talk to a dog to teach sensitive touch and help them be calm.

Having a dog in school has the potential to help pupils to develop in a range of academic, personal and social areas.

Benefits of Well-Being Dogs

Animal assisted therapy can:

- teach empathy and appropriate interpersonal skills
- help individuals develop social skills
- be soothing and the presence of animals can more quickly build rapport between the teacher and pupil, and
- improve individual's skills to pick up social cue's imperative to human relationships.

Research into the effects of well-being dogs in schools is showing a range of benefits including:

- increase in school attendance
- gains in confidence
- decreases in learner anxiety behaviours resulting in improved learning outcomes, such as increases in reading and writing levels
- positive changes towards learning and improved motivation, and
- enhanced relationships with peers and teachers due to experiencing trust and unconditional love from a therapy dog. This in turn helps students learn how to express their feelings and enter into more trusting relationships.

So How Do Therapy Dogs Help?



The first known therapy dog accompanied Austrian neurologist and the founder of psychoanalysis Sigmund Freud.

From pictures and journals, Freud would often have his dog Jofi in his office during psychotherapy sessions. While the dog was originally only in the room as a comfort to Freud, who claimed he felt more relaxed when the dog was nearby, he soon began to notice that the dog also seemed to help comfort other patients during their therapy sessions.

However, the positive benefits of therapy dogs were not discovered formally until Dr Boris Levinson conducted research in the 1960s.

Dr Levinson discovered that his dog had a positive effect on mentally impaired children. When the dog was around and socialising with the young patients, they were more comfortable and showed noticeable changes in their behaviour.

Research has long continued into the validation of animal-assisted therapy, with a most recent study from psychologist Alan Beck and psychiatrist Aaron Katcher.

Using a data-led approach and physiological measurements, they found that when a person interacted or was in the presence of a dog, there were immediate changes in their physical reactions. Breathing became more regular, the heartbeat slowed, muscles relaxed, and there was a significant lowering in nervous system activity which responds to stress.

Since these studies have confirmed the scientific benefits of therapy dogs, they have been hired to support those with phobias, physical impairment and anxiety issues.

Literacy & Numeracy Targets

Every pupil within the academy has an individual literacy and numeracy target set each half term which is monitored throughout each subject. During the summer 1, 92.5% (49/53) of pupils either met or partially met their literacy target and 88.7% (47/53) met or partially met their numeracy target. 62.9% (22/35) of Pupil Premium (PP) have met their literacy target and 50% (14/28) met their numeracy targets. Non-Pupil Premium (non-PP) 57.1% (8/14) met both their literacy and numeracy targets. 5/14 (35.7%) of Non- Pupil Premium partially met both their literacy and numeracy targets. Spellzone and Literacy Planet are being trialled for extra support with spelling. We are looking to invest in a platform for September to support Maths such as Mathletics and Times Tables Rock.

Lexia & RWI

As an academy, we have continued with our extensive screening and assessment process and continuously updating the school development plan regarding reading, comprehension and SEND assessment. We have and are providing training that teachers' need, particularly for the teaching of reading and pupils with SEND. Interventions: all pupils are enrolled onto 'Lexia' our literacy intervention. The identified lowest 20% of pupils in each of the WRAT areas receive additional intervention in reading (1-1), spelling, comprehension (Speech and Language therapist support is in place with four trained staff, (SALT) with screening and action plans for identified need of support.

VPA is providing EAL resources; smaller class sizes; in lesson support; 1-1 support in lesson and outside of lesson. We have introduced Read, Write Inc and 12 members of staff are trained, this is up and runningresults are showing progress. Fresh Start data shows the six-week analysis for progress confirms all pupils have made the required levels of progress. We have a timetable of sessions for targeted pupils which has been amended to focussing on three pupils having daily sessions, this is the advice provided by Fresh Start trainers. Reading continues to be a priority in every lesson across the curriculum.

English



Pupils in year 10 have studied 'An Inspector Calls' play by JB Priestly. It is set in 1912, however was written after the Second World War. It is

a murder mystery play which questions society's role in social responsibility. Pupils have learnt about the

historical context and the class system.

We used the film 'Titanic' to help with the differences in class and the power the rich upper classes held over the working classes. From this, we completed a piece of



creative writing focussing on sentence structures and sentence starters.

Year 9 have been working on creative writing skills. We began by using an image – we used a haunted house and looked at zooming techniques using descriptive language.

We had a Speaking and Listening debate on what had happened to the Titan submarine and followed this in the news until it was discovered.

Inductions



All new students come to me for induction to make their transition into Victory Park Academy, welcoming and engaging in the Academies curriculum.

They are assessed on their levels of reading comprehension & Mathematics, enabling the Academy to place the students into the correct level that they are working towards.

Within the Academy we strive to support all students to achieve the best outcomes for their future.

Fresh Start

The Academy offers a Fresh Start reading intervention for students that needs support, which is a reading programme to help build confidence



and support them to progress in their reading & writing.

We have been supporting a number of students from Primary to year 11, their levels have progressed significantly within this programme.

Occupational Studies



This year in Occupational Studies our pupils have been covering a broad range of topics to explore potential interests and possible career options for the future. We have been learning about a variety of skills in horticulture as well as decorating and bricklaying. We have seen

great engagement in this subject from KS3 pupils as

well as our year 10's and 11's who have been working towards their NCFE qualification, many of which have received level 1 and level 2 awards in this. Great work everyone and thanks for all the hard work.

Princes Trust

This year in Princes Trust our pupils have been learning about topics aimed at helping them examine themselves and the world around them. Pupils have been working on how to prepare for a healthy lifestyle, how to understand their interpersonal and selfmanagement skills, the benefits of participating in exercise and what are the advantages of good teamwork skills. Pupils have really developed in these areas and now have a deeper understanding of themselves and the world around them.

Art



Over three days in June, seven Year 11 pupils created their final pieces for their GCSE Art

qualification based on the theme of 'lock'. They had worked hard for the previous three months researching and experimenting with different idea and materials. They showed a lot of dedication and perseverance to complete their work and all pieces look impressive. Well done to everyone involved!

KS3 Maths

From the start of the year pupils have been working really hard and have covered a range of topics including sequences, converting amounts, balancing equations, one and two step equations, averages and calculating the area of a circle.

If a circle has the radius of 4, what is the area of the circle?

Exams News



With all the examinations now complete for our Year 11 pupils, Victory Park are predicting that 20 out of the 23 (87%) Year 11

pupils will achieve at least five GSCE or equivalent qualifications this June. This year, the Academy has offered over 14 different qualifications ranging from traditional GCSEs to more practically base subjects such as Hair & Beauty, Food Technology and Construction. Good luck to our Year 11 group, results day this year is on Thursday 24th August. The VPA office will be open from 9:00 until 11:00 on this day for collection of results in person, otherwise they will arrive in the post the following day!

Careers



The Careers advice and guidance service at Victory Park (Connexions) along with the support of our staff have been busy discussing the

options open to young people after they leave school. We have been helping them with applying to colleges or apprenticeship schemes to guide them to their next steps after they leave us. We have also run a very successful careers fair with local businesses and college provides in attendance. Our year 10 and 11 pupils also got to visit a careers fair at The Forum in Southend which offered even more options to our pupils for when they make the next step. I am optimistic with all the support we have offered that our pupils will be making some positive next steps when they leave.

GDPR

The school has carried out its annual GDPR audit with everything meeting the necessary requirements. All staff are adhering to the rules ensuring pupil data is protected. All staff have received the latest training and are up to date with all new policies, which was reflected in our external audit.

It's been a great summer term, lots of positive contact with students in primary and secondary, 60 sessions in total! This is amazing, students should be proud of themselves for engaging in therapeutic sessions. I now work two days
