Head's Update

Questionnaire Feedback

We carry out a questionnaire for parents each year and this provides excellent feedback for us to discuss with staff, senior teams, school council and governors to see how we might improve the school and make school even more fabulous for the children. Each week in my update, I will feedback the results from that survey and let you know what we have done to rectify key themes. New ideas and suggestions are also taken on board and acted upon. It takes the form of you said...we did....and hopefully you can then see how we response to feedback form our stakeholders.

Tidying the School Site: You said that some areas of the school were looking untidy and unkempt and we fully agree. The summer has been a hive of activity and we have filled and sent off two full skips of unwanted equipment and chairs. The upper and lower field have been tidied and a vast number of maintenance jobs have been fulfilled including repairing and repainting steps, . we have put in additional lighting from the main office reception to the to the main gate to help with poor visibility in the winter and we plan to do more from the main gate up into the playground as the days get shorter and winter approaches.

We have had all the PE equipment refurbished and re-certified as safe and we have big plans to improve the woodland area behind the Year 6 block - details to follow.

Does your child enjoy school? We asked if your children enjoyed school **97% agreed** that they did with **66.7% strongly agreeing** which is good to know. If your child does not enjoy school then please get in touch with your child's teacher to see what it is that is not engaging them - admittedly some children would prefer to be on their PlayStation all day but learning and getting equipped for the future is going to need some efforts by us as parents and teachers.

The school keeps my child safe: The response for this was **100% agree** with **67% agreeing strongly**. This again is a good indicator of a culmination of all the methods and systems we have in place in school to keep the children safe. With safeguarding so high on the agenda we have kept this at the forefront of all our lessons, activities and trips.

Making good progress at school: **92.4%** of you said you agreed. For the 7.6% who did not agree please make sure you mention your concerns to your child's teacher, ensure you are hearing them read and checking their reading records, and support us in ensuring their homework is completed on time. In the recent welcome meetings it has been a good opportunity to remind parents and carers about the commitments that need to be made to reading and the homework to ensure access to the curriculum and to reinforce key concepts in their homework.

I will continue each week to let you know what we have done in response to your feedback. Thank you to all the parent and carers who completed the questionnaire.

Injuries

School is a lively and active place and injuries do occur. A reminder, more for the Year 3 parents, is that not all scrapes and bumps are reported to parents. If it is an accidental graze or minor bump reporting those would take up all the time of teachers and office team, though we will always record and report non-accidental injury - often catching you on the gate is the easiest way to communicate this, and if your child has bumped their head there is a risk of concussion or a possible reaction later in the day so they will be given a 'bumped head' sticker and wristband. Look out for these and remember to keep a close eye on any dizziness, drowsiness or symptoms of concussion after school. Thank you.

- **Safeguarding Training:** All volunteers will receive basic safeguarding guidance to ensure the safety and wellbeing of our pupils.
- **DBS Check:** A Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check is required for all volunteers working regularly in school.
- **Regular Commitment:** We ask that volunteers offer a consistent time slot each week so staff can plan effectively and make the most of your support.

We understand that giving up your time is a generous offer, and we are truly grateful.

Volunteering at our school is not only rewarding for the children — it is often deeply fulfilling for the volunteers themselves. If your child is taking part in 11+ exams please email so we can make a note on the register and make the class teacher aware. Please bring the child in before or after the exam, absence is only authorised for the exam and not any revision time before the exam. Taking

days off before the exam to revise or 'hot housing' as it is known, is not permitted and will not be authorised.

No teachers at Wallace Fields Juniors tutor for 11+ as they are fully committed to their teaching responsibilities within school - please do not ask them if they tutor. Practice for the 11+ is not part of the National Curriculum for England and Wales and so is not taught in our school.

REMINDERS

Smart Phone Reminder

All smartphones are banned. Mobile phones are not welcome at Wallace Fields Juniors. Children are no safer with a mobile phone, in fact they are in more danger than with a phone.

If you have a Year 5 or 6 who has permission to walk to school and do insist that your child has a mobile phone then parents and pupils must read and understand the Acceptable Use Policy and complete the attached Google form to give permission to bring mobile phones to school. - Feature Phones / dumb phones only – and they must be clearly labelled with the owners name. Any unnamed phones will be confiscated.

- Adapted smartphones are banned – phones where certain criteria/access are turned off or blocked are also banned – as staff cannot spend time checking and selecting certain phones – no smartphones!
- Phones must be handed in to the School Office/teacher at the beginning of the school day and collected at the end.
- Any phones found in bags (they may go off and as a safeguarding issue this allows for bag searches) or on their person will be confiscated.
- Only parents may collect confiscated phones from the office.
- Phones are not allowed to be used on the school site and must be turned off before they come onto school grounds.
- The school accepts no responsibility for the loss or damage of any phones brought into school.
- No smart watches are permitted in the school.
- Tags and tracking devices are NOT permitted on school trips and visits.

Earrings Reminder

Pupils are only allowed one pierced gold/silver stud earring in each ear and earrings cannot be worn during P.E. If your child is unable to remove their earrings they will not be allowed to participate in P.E. – we do not allow pupils to cover earrings with plasters. We recommend that children do not wear their earrings on the day they have P.E. or Games. Parents must, therefore, decide at the beginning of the summer holidays if you wish to have your child's ears pierced. This will give enough time for the ears to heal and for the removal of earrings.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about ONLINE SLANG

Slang moves fast – and for many young people, it's not just how they talk, but how they share their identity and feelings. Learning key terms helps adults connect and show understanding, even if the lingo seems baffling at first.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

- GENERATIONAL MISCOMMUNICATION**
Words like 'rizz' or 'slaps' can be misunderstood by adults, leading to awkward moments or a breakdown in trust. These phrases often carry subtle social meanings among young people.
- RAPIDLY SHIFTING MEANINGS**
Slang changes quickly. A term like 'bop' might sound innocent one week and be repurposed the next. This makes it easy for adults to fall behind and for children to misstep.
- SHIELDING BULLYING OR EXCLUSION**
Inside jokes and trending terms like 'simp' or 'NPC' can be used to mock or exclude others. What looks like harmless fun might actually reinforce social divisions or bullying.
- PERFORMING FOR THE ALGORITHM**
Slang often reflects what's popular on platforms like TikTok. Young users might exaggerate or act out for likes, creating online personas that don't match their real selves.
- CONTENT MODERATION WITH CODED SPEECH**
To avoid content filters, young people sometimes use slang or emojis to talk about serious topics – for example, saying 'unalive' instead of other death-related terms. This makes harmful content harder to spot.
- LONG-TERM DIGITAL FOOTPRINT**
A slang-filled post might seem funny now but could resurface years later during job checks or university applications – possibly out of context, but still damaging.

Advice for Parents & Educators

- KEEP UP, DON'T CATCH UP**
Follow youth culture pages or ask your child about new slang. Staying informed shows that you're engaged and open to understanding their world.
- FOCUS ON CONNECTION OVER CONTROL**
Being someone your child can talk to is more valuable than using strict filters or monitoring apps. Openness builds trust.
- ASK, DON'T INTERROGATE**
Use open questions to invite conversation. You're not quizzing them – just trying to learn more about their online lives.
- ENCOURAGE CRITICAL MEDIA LITERACY**
Talk about where slang comes from, how it spreads, and how it can impact others. This helps young people use language more thoughtfully.

ONLINE SLANG CHEAT SHEET

The following slang terms are common examples – please be aware this isn't an exhaustive list and both meaning and prevalence can change swiftly.

COMMON SLANG:	POTENTIALLY CONCERNING SLANG
<ul style="list-style-type: none">Sigma – Independent, self-reliant (often male) mindset; proud outsider status. Often celebrated in motivational memes.Skibidi – Nonsense word from the viral 'Skibidi Toilet' meme; expresses chaos or fun. Usually harmless but pervasive.Chat – The collective audience or group of viewers (e.g. on a livestream). Used when addressing followers directly.Lock in – To focus, commit or get serious (e.g. before gaming or sports). Positive encouragement to concentrate.Cooking – Doing something exceptionally well or gaining momentum. Opposite of 'cooked'.Rizz – Charisma or flirting ability (short for charisma). Can praise social confidence.Aura or aura farming – One's perceived 'energy' or vibe; 'farming' means manufacturing clout.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Bop – An adult content creator (e.g. OnlyFans). Indicates exposure to 18+ material.Gyat or gyatt – Sexualised exclamation about someone's backside. Objectifies appearance.Tralalero tralala / bombardino crocodile / tung tung tung sahur – Spammy references to AI-generated creatures with 'Italian-sounding' names. Can clog chats, derail discussion, and harass others.Glazing – Overpraising or obsessively defending a streamer or celebrity.Crash out – To lose control, give up or have a meltdown; sometimes hints at self harm.Cooked – Ruined, exhausted or in serious trouble; sometimes mental health-related.Unalive – Euphemism for death or suicide; used to avoid content filters.NPC – Used to suggest someone is lacking independent thoughts or is repetitive and predictable.
