Thanks to all the parents and carers for their active support, kind words and positive feedback - that all makes a huge difference to morale in school. It leaves me to say have a very restful summer and we look forward to seeing most of you back again in the autumn term.

#### **Fantastic National Test Results (SATs)**

The results are through for the National Tests (SATs) and they are absolutely fantastic. I am so impressed with the Year 6 who showed wonderful levels of attainment following their four years of education here at Wallace Fields Junior School. The consistency of practice, high expectations, intervention, maths groups, adult support and well led core subjects have resulted in very high levels of children at standard and high results for greater depth. The children have worked hard and did their very best. As you know I like the school focus to be on safety and happiness first within school and when children feel safe and happy they learn much more effectively. The children have become familiar with testing and application of their knowledge and this is very evident in the results. These tests are sent away and marked externally (not seen and practiced like the KS1 tests) so the results are very reliable and externally accredited. My congratulations go to the children for doing their best - they are well above the national average scores. My thanks also to the whole teaching team and teaching staff who input learning at every level, in every year group, to ensure the children reach their full potential. The Year 6 children get their individual results with their reports on Monday. Here is a summary of the Wallace Fields Juniors results:

#### **Exciting Summer Building Projects**

There are a number of big projects going on over the summer, these include redesigning the old computer suite since the children no longer visit a room for computer studies and complete their technical work on Chromebooks in the classroom. This project includes fitting a dividing wall in the computer suite to create a sensory classroom and a meeting room. This will provide two learning spaces for phonics and intervention. The second big project is the installation of an all-weather

surface beyond the activity trail. This all-weather surface is the culmination of four years of fundraising and we will use some school funds to enable completion.

The club takes place once a month at lunch time (Tuesdays Yrs 3 and 6 and Wednesdays Yrs 4 and 5) and aims to encourage your child to enjoy reading for pleasure, introducing them to new authors and genres they wouldn't normally choose and widening their appreciation of books and stories. We pick from a choice of titles each month and come prepared to talk about what we've read over the past 4 weeks.

We also have a monthly question from the Book Monster which fosters discussion on wider topics such as 'Should you ever watch the movie before reading the book?' and 'Which book characters would you most like to have over for supper?' We do a literary-based quiz or game at the end of each term, with prizes and at the end of the academic year children receive certificates to celebrate their reading.

Many of the children who attend book club do so throughout their four years. I have added some testimonials from Year 6 parents below.

The fee per term is £20 per child. You then source the books from a store or library. The wonderful WFJS school library is constantly being updated and so often has copies.

There will be four re-enactors playing the writers details of which are below. To run alongside the event, we are holding a poetry competition for local children to write poems on what they like about the local area or a local place.

These will be judged by the poet Ana Mclaughlin in the following age groups 5-8, 9-12, and 13-16. If there is the demand, we could add and further older age group. The top three in each group will win a signed copy of her new anthology Heroes and Villains, which will be presented by her at a special event in October at Bourne Hall. Mrs Beeton the Victorian author of the Book of Household Management, wrote one of the most famous cookery books ever published. The first instalment, published in 1861, was an immediate success, selling over 60,000 copies in its first year and nearly two million by 1868. She lived in Epsom for many years before her marriage.

Robert Fabian was a police officer, who rose to the rank of Detective Superintendent in the Metropolitan Police. After retirement from the force in 1949, he worked as crime writer. His work was dramatised in the 1954–6 BBC drama series Fabian of the Yard based on his book of the same name centred on New Scotland Yard. He lived locally and died in Epsom Hospital in 1978.

Samuel Pepys had the best-documented life of his time, not just because he was a key figure running the Royal Navy, but because the nine-year period covered by his diary gives a unique insight into his daily actions and innermost thoughts. During this period Pepys visited our area on six occasions: once in 1663, four times in 1665 and once in 1667. He spent time in Ewell and Nonsuch Palace. He makes it clear that he was already well-acquainted with the area: a cousin lived at Ashtead and Samuel spent time there as a boy.

Charles Dickens, the greatest novelist of the Victorian period, created some of literature's best-known fictional character. His novels and short stories enjoyed unprecedented popularity during his lifetime and are still widely read today. Dickens visited and wrote about the Derby, and it even appears in one of his books. He once said that you could fire a cannon ball down Epsom High Street 364 days of the year and it would hit no one, but take out half of England on the 365th – Derby Day.



### Update for the Bourne Hall Living History Day on 20<sup>th</sup> July 10am to 5pm



You can chat to our Stone Age visitors about their lives, and you can see from the picture they will come dressed for the English summer!

The Roman living history group Britannia will arrive bringing with them a portable ballista, one of the siege machines you can see in action at the beginning of the film *Gladiator* together with a small catapult or onager. These will be fired during the day as part of their display. Britannia are veterans of the film's battle scene, and you may recognise some of them from the *Horrible Histories* programmes and the recent Sky TV series *Britannia*. During the day they will be training children in Roman army drill and fighting skills. A battle of the champions will also take place between an Iron Age warrior and the emperor's gladiators.

# Prehistory Exhibition Part of the CBA Festival of Archaeology 15 July to 31 December 2024



Visit Bourne Hall Museum's exhibition on life in the area during prehistory. Items on display from the Stone Age to the Iron Age telling how folk came to its spring to hunt and drink and how during the Bronze Age the spring became a place where the gods lived, and gifts were thrown in as offerings. On display will be the bones of an aurochs, a now extinct ancestor of modern cattle. This one died some 3500 years ago and was buried on Epsom Downs. Aurochs survived well into modern times, the last known individual dying in 1627. The size of the aurochs bulls varied between 155 cm and 180 cm, depending on the local circumstances. The size of cows was between 135 cm and 155 cm. Bulls were significantly larger than cows. The body shape of an aurochs was different from many developed cattle breeds today.

Enjoy a guided walk around Nonsuch Park and explore the history of the beautiful landscape. See where the original palace once stood and how it dominated the local area.

Hear stories of luxurious palaces, ambitious royalty, a lost church, and lingering ghosts. Listen to tales of battles and discover how warfare has touched this ancient landscape. Discover which famous television presenter's ancestors used to live here and how a Queen once came to tea.

Ewell Grove hides a long history from the Bronze Age through the Romans up to modern times. Traces of the Iron Age and Roman settlement have been found there and it became the site of Ewell's Saxon cemetery. Its secret tunnels and the traces of Nonsuch Palace in its boundary wall add to its mystery.

#### Romans Britannia Group of re-enactors

Meet the new Roman governor of Britain as he stops over in Ewell, protected by members of the Praetorian Guard, to make an offering to the sacred springs. The governor has arrived in Ewell coming up from the South Coast on the new road built as a route to London. His encampment contains many of his entourage; they will show visitors the Roman way of life, food, trades, and crafts. The governor will be looking to recruit men for the army, while gladiators will fight to the death to entertain him, hoping to win a chance to fight in the imperial city. Roman Ewell was a stopping-off point on this road where folk could rest, eat, and stay the night. They could also make an offering of a coin or brooch in the sacred spring or leave a larger offering in one of the sacred shafts dug deep in the chalk just outside the settlement. Each shaft was sealed with the bones of three dogs to protect them.
