HEAD'S UPDATE

Moving to a Non-Mobile School from September 2026

From September 2026, our school will be moving towards a non-mobile phone environment. This means that children will not be permitted to bring mobile phones into school at any time, including before school, during the day, or at collection. Following the ban on smartphones this extends to all mobile phone devices.

This change is in line with current government directives encouraging schools to restrict mobile phones in school in order to support children's wellbeing, reduce distractions and improve focus. Many schools across the country are now adopting similar approaches, and

the evidence shows that creating mobile-free environments helps children to feel calmer, more settled and more engaged with their learning. At primary level it is also a social pressure regarding devices as a status symbol. Many schools are taking similar steps, and we believe it will have a very positive impact on wellbeing and behaviour.

We do understand that some families use small **GPS trackers** when children travel to and from school for peace of mind . These devices will still be allowed, provided they are silent and kept inside your child's bag. Some parents track their children without their child's knowledge - this is your prerogative. Trackers will not be permitted on school trips, as we follow very clear safeguarding and supervision arrangements on outings and trackers on trips breach privacy, do not have consent of all people on the trip and violate harassment laws (Act 1997). Details will be shared in the coming weeks - any personal tracking devices and any devices that are able to connect to the internet are still not permissible and will continue to be prohibited in September.

If you ever need to contact your child during the school day, or they need to contact you, our school office is always available to help. We want you to feel confident that communication will continue to be easy and safe.

Thank you for your support as we make this extended transition to mobile free environment. In reality we only have about three 'non feature' phones coming in at the moment so the impact will be minimal. Our aim is always to create the best possible environment for our children, and we believe this change will help them feel calmer, safer and more connected to their learning and to one another.

Stars of Week



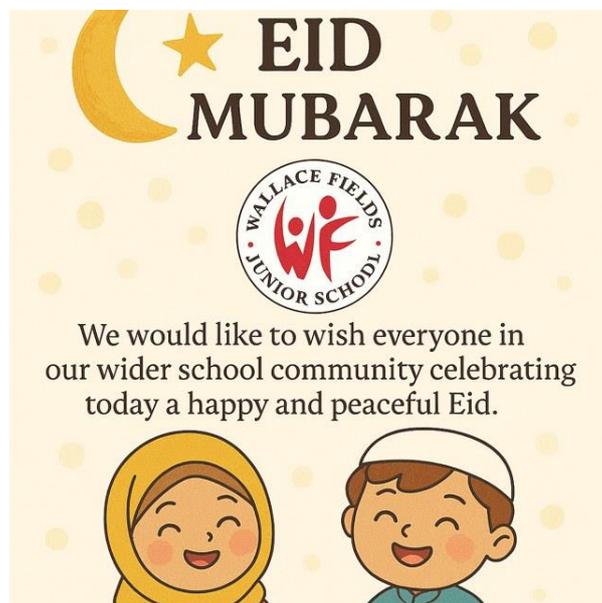

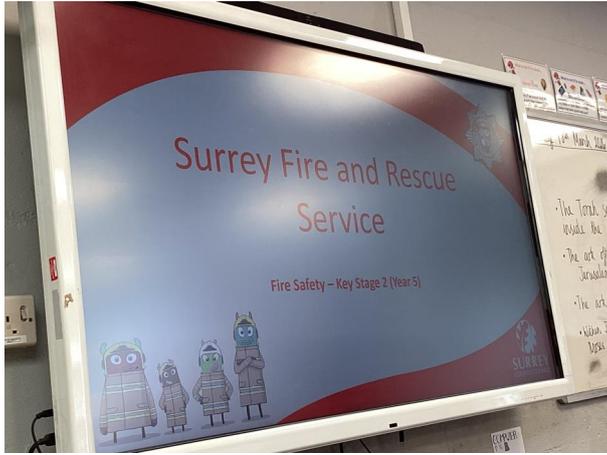

Year 5 Fire Safety Visit

Year 5 were visited by Jen from Surrey Fire and Rescue Service on Wednesday. Jen spoke to us about keeping ourselves safe and how to identify possible fire risks in our homes and school. She spoke about regularly checking our smoke alarms and if you hear a smoke alarm, we need to '**get out, stay out, call 999**'. Jen gave out magnets for each Year 5 child to remind families to check their smoke alarm every week. We discussed Fire Action Plans, like the fire drills we do in school. We do these regularly to know how to appropriately respond in the case of a real emergency. Some children said they have a fire action plan at home; **it is really important that all children know how to safely exit their home in case of an emergency.** We spoke about the importance of having a Plan A and Plan B. This is necessary in case of smoke outside a bedroom door, or the bottom of stairs (for example).

Fire Safety Information for Parents and Carers



Dear Parents and Carers,

Your child recently took part in a fire safety session led by Surrey Fire and Rescue Service, where they learned key skills to help keep themselves and others safe.

We encourage you to take a few minutes to speak with your child about what they learned. As a follow-up, we'd also like to share some important steps you can take to help keep your family safe from fire — and be prepared in case of an emergency.

Fire Safety in The Home

How you can keep your family safe from fire:

- **Smoke alarms save lives:** Make sure you have working smoke alarms fitted on every level of your home. Test them once a week.
- **Fire action plan:** In case of an emergency, create a fire action plan with your family. Make sure everyone knows the quickest and safest way out — and that exit routes are kept clear. [Home fire action plan - Surrey County Council](#) Remember 'Get out, stay out and call 999!'
- **Check before bed:** Turn off and unplug all electrical appliances (unless they are designed to be left on — like your fridge/freezer), turn heaters off, use fire guards, and properly extinguish candles and cigarettes. Ensure internal doors are closed to help stop the fire spreading.



Calling 999

- **Know your address:** Teach children their home address in case they ever need to call 999.
- **Calling 999 is free** from any phone and is answered 24 hours a day.

Clothing Fires

What to do if your clothes catch fire:

Stop, Drop & Roll — stop moving, drop to the ground, and roll to smother flames.



For wheelchair users: Stop, Cover to Smother — use a material like a blanket or coat to smother the flames.

Seasonal Safety- Water Safety at Home, Pools and Open Water



As the weather warms up, we are sharing key reminders to help keep children safe around water at home, in pools and near lakes or rivers. Even shallow water can pose a risk, so close supervision is essential.

Water Safety at Home & in the Garden - [Splash Safety at Your Pad](#) - [Water Safety at Home](#)

- Empty sinks, paddling pools and buckets after use and store them upside down.
- Keep washing machines, toilets and outdoor water containers shut.
- Supervise children closely around ponds or water features and ensure fences and gates are secure.
- Keep bath plugs out of reach and never leave children unattended in the bath.



Pool & Swimming Safety

- Always keep children within arm's reach in and around the pool.
- Encourage walking—wet surfaces can be slippery.
- Check water is clear before jumping in and avoid diving areas.
- Follow poolside rules and listen carefully to lifeguards.

Lakes, Rivers & Open Water Safety

- Stay back from edges; banks can be loose or slippery.
- Be aware that open water can be cold, fast-moving or hiding hazards.
- Wear a life jacket when on or near open water.
- Stay together.

Please follow the **Water Safety Code** whenever you are around water. A helpful poster is attached for you to share at home.

STEM Hub & Earthwatch: Citizen Science in Action

This week, 5S took part in an inspiring virtual session with STEM Hub in collaboration with Earthwatch. Pupils learned about becoming citizen scientists and explored why it's so important to understand and protect the freshwater around us - only about 3% of the world's water supply. While this is enough for everyone, we all have a role in helping to keep it clean.

The children revisited the water cycle and discussed simple ways we can look after rivers, streams, ponds and other freshwater sources in our communities.

Earthwatch also introduced the Great UK WaterBlitz, a biannual event where people across the country test local freshwater quality. This helps scientists build a clearer national picture of water health. From learning how to respond safely in an emergency, to understanding how to stay aware in public spaces, to exploring how everyday choices can affect personal wellbeing, the Junior

Citizen Scheme offered pupils an exciting opportunity to develop confidence and resilience in a practical setting.

The day proved both educational and memorable, and we were very proud to see our Year 6 pupils rise to each challenge with enthusiasm. They returned to school eager to share the new skills and knowledge they had gained.

Stationery Shop Prices

Following feedback received by the School Council about the prices of items in the school stationery shop, we undertook a full review to ensure that the shop continues to serve pupils well.

The investigation showed that, despite the concerns raised, the shop has actually been operating at a loss and several items had not increased in price for many years, even though wholesale costs have risen steadily. To continue offering good-quality stationery, remain competitive with high street prices, and maintain the convenience of purchasing items directly in school, we will be updating our prices after the Easter break.

Children will still be able to buy items at the original prices **until the start of the summer term**, giving everyone time to adjust. We are grateful to the School Council for raising the concerns and helping us ensure the shop remains a helpful service for all pupils.

Additional Lunchtime Choice for Year 3 – After Easter

We are pleased to let you know that, after the Easter break, **Year 3 children will have the opportunity to enjoy an additional lunchtime choice provided by Emma**, our head cook from our Twelve15 kitchen team.

Emma, our head cook, is keen to offer more variety at lunchtimes and currently provides a 'Filled Wrap option' on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and a 'Filled Jacket Potato option' on Tuesdays and Thursdays. **This system is already in place for Year 4**, where a limited number of portions are available each day. To ensure fairness, Emma keeps a daily list and marks off who have received a portion. A number of Year 3 children have asked if they can take part, so from after Easter, the same arrangement will be extended to them. Please be aware that **availability will remain limited**, and Year 3 children will be included on a fair, rotational basis, just as Year 4 children are.

For reference, **Year 5 and 6 pupils** continue to make their choices in advance by completing a form a few weeks before.

Menu options are as follows:

- **Monday, Wednesday and Friday** – Filled Wraps with Cheese, Ham, Tuna or Egg
- **Tuesday and Thursday** – Filled Jacket Potato with Cheese, Cheese and Beans or Tuna

We hope this additional choice will make lunchtimes even more enjoyable for our pupils. If you have any questions, please contact the school office.

Final Details for Year 3 Trip to Butser Farm

Year 3 are very excited to be going on a trip to Butser Ancient Farm on Thursday 26th March 8.00 am to 3.30 pm. Please see the letter sent by email with all the details but the key information are as follows:-

- **THERE IS AN EARLY START FOR THIS TRIP Children need to arrive at 8.00am.** It is an early start so please ensure your child is in school at 8.00 a.m. for registration as the coach will be leaving school promptly at **8.15a.m.**
- We will be leaving Butser at 2pm so **should be back at school for 3.30pm.** Please check your email for any news on delays to this time, please do not call the School Office.
- Children should wear **school uniform on their top half** (Jumper or cardigan, shirt and tie) and **casual clothing on their bottom half** such as jogging bottoms or jeans suitable for messy activities.
- Children should wear **trainers** to wear all day that are suitable for muddy conditions and bring a change of shoes in a carrier bag
- All **MUST** bring a **named waterproof raincoat** as they will be outside all day and depending on weather extra layers, sun cream and hat.
- They should take a **water bottle** and a **packed lunch in a small back pack.**
- If any children have **specific allergies** and may need antihistamine medicine such as Piriton products; then please let their class teacher know and provide a named container on the morning of the trip.
- If children suffer from **travel sickness** alert teachers by Wednesday 25th March. Administer medicine before they get dropped off and supply named medication for the return journey.
- If you haven't done so already, **please don't forget to pay on Scopay.** The voluntary contribution is £52 per child to cover the cost of two trips - Butser Farm trip and Wisley Gardens. Smaller instalments are available and financial assistance may be possible on request. We will treat payment as permission to take part in the trip.

REMINDER AND USEFUL INFORMATION

Get Running Around at Playtimes!

Some children have recently been spreading a few very silly rumours suggesting that they are not allowed to run on the playground. We would like to reassure everyone that this is completely and utterly not true. The playground is very much a place for running, playing, laughing and making noise. It is designed for children to be active and to enjoy themselves.

The confusion seems to have come from rules about certain high-risk games rather than running itself. Children are absolutely not banned from running. However, for safety reasons, any game that involves large numbers of pupils charging across the playground in a crowd is not permitted. These types of games can lead to collisions and unnecessary injuries.

One specific game that is banned is British Bulldog. This applies even if it is renamed, for example as 'Cross the River' or 'Family It'. Changing the name does not make the game safer. British Bulldog is not allowed in most schools nationwide because of the high injury risk and our school follows the same guidance.

Children are encouraged to run, play chasing games in small groups, and enjoy the playground energetically while keeping themselves and others safe. There is equipment at lunchtime, marked tracks, a buddy bench, an outdoor classroom with activities, two champ pitches with balls provided, basketball, two table tennis tables and the whole lower field is open to run on if it has been dry. There is also the all weather astro pitch and this is timetabled to ensure all classes get a go on it - so there is plenty to do and lots of room to enjoy. We are lucky to have such a lot of open space. If you have any questions about playground rules, please speak to a member of staff.

SAFEGUARDING and WELLBEING

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about ONLINE TRENDS ENCOURAGING VIOLENCE

7 out of 10 teens report seeing violent content on social media, with over half of that content featuring fights involving young people. Most don't 'seek' it but are shown it through social media feeds or messaging groups. 9% of young people involved in violence have seen violent social media content. Viol threats, challenges, or 'wars' that spread online risk encouraging violence offline, while real-world incidents may also be recorded and promoted online.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ALGORITHMIC EXPOSURE
Social media platforms are designed to keep users engaged, increasing exposure to relevant content. Recommendation content that affects users' posts, interactions, or search algorithms may lead them to violent material if they have viewed, commented on, or shared related content. Exposure to violent content is more frequent in their feeds without their full understanding why.

WEAPONS AND CRIMINAL RISK
Teens exposed to high levels of real-world violence on social media sometimes report feeling an increased need to carry a weapon for 'self-protection'. However, carrying a weapon increases the risk of involvement. Theft and injury by others for young people, in addition, carrying a weapon is a serious offence that can lead to police arrest and a criminal record.

SHARING VIOLENT CONTENT
Encouraging or sharing an offence is a crime in the UK. Uploading to social media and forwarding or reposting violent content increases the risk for young people. Uploading or reposting content that has been used to threaten or harm others may also be a crime or sharing it within large messaging groups.

FEAR, ANXIETY, AND MARGINALISATION
Research shows young people's emotional wellbeing can be negatively impacted by repeated exposure to social media content, especially when it depicts 'real-world' violence (as opposed to fictional depictions) or scenes of attack, fear, and fights. 'Real-world' violence is generally going to be a more shocking experience of anxiety or fear among young people, because of their identity, such as their nationality or religion, can also make allegations harmful for children belonging to those groups.

AVOIDANCE AND ISOLATION
Real-world violence on social media can increase young people's belief that their social communities – or the broader world – are generally a dangerous place. This can lead to avoidant and solitary behaviours, which may negatively affect their learning. As well as feeling fearful of others, teens often report being judged for spending time in online groups, which may affect their social interactions in their lives.

Advice for Parents & Educators

STAY INFORMED
Stay alert for updates from police, schools, or local authorities, and follow the advice provided. Be cautious about unofficial accounts, fake content, or misinformation, which can spread very quickly. Ensure you get accurate information from trusted sources and encourage young people to do the same. Parents have the right to share violent content online and to speak to a trusted adult online.

DISCUSS SOCIAL MEDIA
Encourage young people to talk about the content they see online and the effect it can have. This can be an opportunity to discuss topics such as misinformation, AI-generated content, the circulation of content, and how to report content. Discuss how and why extreme content can spread online. Systems look available to block, report, and remove harmful content, and help report where to get help and advice, such as reportoffensivecontent.com.

TALK CRIME AND SAFETY
In most of the UK, the age of criminal responsibility is 10 (12 in Scotland). This means there can be serious criminal consequences for carrying a weapon, taking part in violence, or threatening or sharing violent content. Discuss the law with young people through practical safety strategies. Ask questions such as: 'What would you do if you feel unsafe?' Work together on action plans and remind them they can contact a trusted adult or the police if they witness or experience violence.

ENCOURAGE POSITIVE ACTION
Focus on strengthening young people's positive experiences both online and within their local communities. Discuss strategies to reduce negative social media effects, such as time limits, withdrawing content accounts, or taking breaks from apps. Encourage offline activities such as spending time with friends, visiting local places, and taking part in hobbies that bring them joy. Parents and educators can support them when they can seek support with any concerns at any time via childline.org.uk.

You Won't Know 'til You Ask (DSIT)

The UK government has launched the 'Kids Online Safety' campaign to help parents and carers support their children to navigate the digital world safely and confidently.

The campaign brings together practical, trusted guidance on how to start meaningful conversations about online life, understand the types of content children may encounter,

and build critical thinking skills so young people can question what they see and make safer choices.

It also offers advice on using tools such as parental controls, recognising potential risks and knowing where to seek help or report concerns. The overall aim is to make online safety an ongoing, open dialogue within families rather than a one-off conversation, helping children feel supported as they explore apps, games and social media.
