Head's Update

Achieving Their Best at Wallace Fields Junior School

I have been advised by governors and stakeholders to sing the praises a little louder locally and to spread that insight to our school community. I am not completely comfortable with this level of self promotion as I feel my efforts should be in steering the ship in the right direction and ensure all on board are enjoying their learning journey. However I have been encouraged to let you know that at Wallace Fields Junior School, our pride in our **long-standing record of strong academic achievement**, is reflected year after year in the high standards our pupils reach by the end of Key Stage 2. Our reputation within the local area continues to shine, with the school recognised as one of the top primary schools in Epsom and Ewell, consistently placing highly in local comparisons thanks to the exceptional progress and attainment of our pupils.

Parents and carers often comment on how effectively our dedicated teaching team **supports every child to achieve their best**. This commitment is echoed in external evaluations: Ofsted highlights the school's *broad, ambitious curriculum, strong pupil engagement, and consistently positive learning culture*, all of which contribute to our pupils' excellent outcomes across core subjects.

While National Tests (SATs) results provide only one snapshot of children's learning, our school's history of high attainment—particularly the **strong proportion of pupils working securely and those reaching greater depth**—illustrates how well our pupils rise to academic challenge. As Ofsted notes, *pupils take pride in their achievements, behave exceptionally well, and benefit from high-quality teaching that builds their knowledge securely year on year*. These strengths support the consistently impressive outcomes our children achieve at the end of Year 6.

I am even more impressed with the caring, inclusive and friendly atmosphere we have in the school with the hard working and kind children and staff and I would like to thank all those parents who support this ethos and really make Wallace Fields Juniors special.

Our academic success is strengthened by the inclusive, encouraging ethos that permeates the school. *"Pupils feel safe within the spacious grounds, are cared for by committed staff, and enjoy learning together"*, helping to prepare them not only for SATs but for a smooth and successful transition to secondary school and life beyond WFJS. I believe that our families are assured that their children at Wallace Fields Junior School are consistently supported to achieve, excel, and enjoy their learning journey.

No Trackers On Trips

Some families use Apple Air Tags and similar tracking devices to help keep children safe in daily life, and these are sometimes placed discreetly in bags. While we appreciate that this provides reassurance at home, such devices are **not permitted on school trips**. For the safety and privacy of all pupils and staff, we will carry out a full check of bags the day before each trip, using approved software to locate any hidden trackers. Any device found will be removed and stored securely until the trip has concluded. Modern smartphones automatically alert users if an unknown tracker is moving with them (anti stalking software), which means staff will receive a notification if any device remains undiscovered. To avoid disruption, we ask parents to ensure all Air Tags and similar trackers are removed before the pre-trip check. Thank you for your support in helping us maintain safe and well-managed visits.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

No Make Up and Nail Polish Permitted and Long Hair Must Be Tied Up

We have had an increasing number of Year 6 children coming up with lip gloss, mascara, curled eyelashes, nail polish and colourful spot stickers. Please ensure that your children are aware that make up and nail polish are not permitted at school and class teachers will be keeping a close eye on this. Mr Lee keeps polish remover in his office so children will be sent to him to remove any nail polish. the class teachers are sourcing wipes to remove facial make up.

Children also a reminder that long hair, touching the shoulders, must be totally tied back off the face, not half up and half down. Hair must be brushed or combed so it is neat and tidy. As per school policy there must be no extremes of hair (spiky/Mohican/shaved patterns) or hair dyes or gels.


Special Person Shop for Mother's Day

REMINDER AND USEFUL INFORMATION

School Attendance

As a reminder, Wallace Fields Junior School, along with other local schools and Surrey County Council, firmly believe that all pupils benefit from regular school attendance. **Full and regular attendance at school is crucial for a child's future life chances** and establishes a positive work ethic early in life. To this end, we will do all we can to encourage parents/carers to ensure their children achieve maximum possible attendance and that any problems that prevent full attendance are identified and acted on promptly. Pupils are expected to achieve 100% attendance but when absence is unavoidable, parents/carers will be required to inform the school at the earliest opportunity. The school is required to meet with the Attendance Advice & Intervention Officer (AAIO) every month to discuss all low attendances and they will want to see a plan in place to show how improvement in attendance is going to be achieved. Medical evidence is required for repeated appointments or time out of school.

As an example of how quickly absences can impact the child's school learning experience:

- **100% attendance** - represents no absences or significant lateness
- **95 - 97% attendance** - represents **10 days of absence** a year. This is classed a good attendance, and it is understood that some childhood illnesses will leave children having time off.
- **91 - 94% attendance** - This is classed as **needing improvement**. At this stage the child's attendance is monitored and a letter may be sent to explain the importance of attendance.

- **86 - 90% attendance** - This is classed as a **cause for concern**. Children in this category are missing at least a month of school a year and are classed as Persistent Absence. A letter is likely to be sent to the parents/carers and will be referred to the AAIO. The parents/carers are likely to be asked to come in to school for a meeting to participate in developing an action plan to address the issues.
- **81 - 85% attendance** - Children are missing at least 6 weeks of school a year, i.e. half a term. Parents / Carers will be asked to come in to school for a meeting and will be **referred to the AAIO**.
- **<80% attendance** - 38 days absence a year. Children are **missing a year of school over 5 years** and will be referred to the AAIO.

As part of this, it is vital that children are in school in a timely manner to ensure that they attend their lessons and do not miss any teaching time.

Please ensure your child arrives in school between 8.40am and 8.50am to give them time to settle and meet their friends. Late arrivals causes distress to children and also causes delays to the office procedures.

Keeping Feet Dry at Lunchtime – Spare Trainers Reminder

With the wet weather upon us, we want to make sure children stay comfortable throughout the day. If you would like, children can bring a pair of trainers to change into for outdoor play at lunchtime and then switch back to their school shoes for the afternoon. This helps keep their feet dry and ensures they are ready for learning after lunch.

Our older pupils are already familiar with this routine, but Year 3 children may not have been reminded. If your child is in PE kit, they can bring a spare pair of trainers that can get wet during playtime.

To make things easier, we recommend popping the trainers into a clearly labelled bag so they can be stored neatly and easily identified.

Head Lice - A Quick Reminder

Head lice and nits are very common among young children and their families. They are not caused by dirty hair and are usually picked up through head-to-head contact. While there is no guaranteed way to prevent head lice, regular wet combing with a detection comb can help catch them early and stop them spreading.

Following a recent case in Year 3, we kindly ask parents—particularly of Year 3 children—to check their child's hair using a detection comb.

If you find any eggs or lice, please treat them promptly using a medicated lotion or spray, which can be purchased from pharmacies, supermarkets, or online. This will help ensure they do not return to school untreated.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

ROBLOX

Roblox is an online platform where users can play and create games known as 'experiences' made by other users. Roblox has a large UK audience. ITV News has reported that millions of people in Britain use the platform regularly, with children forming a significant proportion of its users. The sheer scale of it makes it extremely difficult to moderate effectively, creating risks for unsupervised children.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Roblox offers a mix of traditional video games in that it hosts millions of user-created experiences. The platform is a mix of self-rated and moderated content. Each experience is self-rated by its creator rather than by the platform. The rating is based on a fixed set of age-appropriate content. Each rating is a general guide and not a guarantee. For example, a game that is rated 12 is not necessarily suitable for 12-year-olds. This is the case with PEGI-rated games. With millions of user-created experiences, it is not always automated which means that inappropriate content can be made available to younger players and have a harmful effect.

A PLATFORM RATHER THAN A GAME

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MATURE CONTENT

With much of Roblox's moderation automated, it is important that parents and carers are aware of what content is available and what is appropriate for their child. Roblox has self-ratings and content filtering, but it is not always perfect. Younger players are likely to encounter content over which they have no control.

IN-GAME SPENDING

Roblox is free to play, but many experiences and cosmetics include optional purchases. These purchases can be used to get advantages in games. This business model is not unique to Roblox, but reporting has highlighted the concern that children are spending large amounts of money unthinkingly or without understanding the real-world cost.

RISK OF ADDICTION

Roblox encourages repeated and extended play through a combination of short tasks, rewards, and progression systems. These systems encourage users to play for longer periods of time. Some games also use social features to encourage frequent login. These designs can be problematic for children. The amount of time spent online may affect sleep, schoolwork, or other activities if boundaries are not in place.

COMMUNICATION WITH OTHER USERS

Roblox includes text and voice features that allow players to chat in shared game spaces. The platform has a range of tools and moderation tools, media investigations have removed many inappropriate messages, but harmful messages can still get through. There are also concerns about the safety of children's grooming. In responses, Roblox has announced changes to its moderation tools and plans to use facial age-detection technology to remove inappropriate images and children they do not know.

Advice for Parents & Educators

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Roblox's parental controls provide an important starting point. Linking a child's account to a parent's account, using parental controls, limit communication features, and review recent activity. Regularly updating parental controls and understanding what they see online can help reduce the risk of exposure to inappropriate content.

CONSIDER LIMITING OR DISABLING CHAT

Although Roblox is introducing lighter age-based chat restrictions, some parents and educators may prefer to disable chat entirely for younger children. Children can still communicate with others through other supervised platforms.

PLAY TOGETHER WHERE POSSIBLE

Playing Roblox with a child can help adults understand the types of experiences children have online. This can help parents and carers identify potential risks and engagement can also make it easier for children to raise concerns if something feels self-feeding or inappropriate. Parents and educators should monitor all games played on Roblox due to its self-feeding nature.

ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Many Roblox experiences are creative and age appropriate, and for many children, this is an important way to socialise with their peers. Encouraging open conversations about online safety, spending, and how to respond to inappropriate behaviour.
