Key teaching point:		Each syllable is like a 'beat' in a word.	The /f/, /l/, /s/and /k/ sounds are usually spelt ff, ll, ss, zz and ck if they come straight after a vowel. Exceptions: if, pal, us, bus, yes.	If the ending sounds like /s/ or /z/, it is spelt as -s. If the ending sounds like /lz/ and forms an extra syllable/beat in the word, it is spelt as -es	If the ending sounds like /s/ or /z/, it is spelt as -s. If the ending sounds like /lz/ and forms an extra syllable/beat in the word, it is spelt as -es.	y is a common spelling at the end of a word when you can hear an ee sound.
