Key teaching point:		<p>Nouns ending -cy have -ies added when pluralised which creates an exception.</p> <p style="color: blue;">Words where the c makes a sh (/ʃ/) sound are spelt ci followed by ent/ence/ency.</p>	<p>Some words with i and e making an ee (/i:/) sound do not follow the rule and should be learnt separately.</p>	<p>Some words are spelt ch even though they make a /k/ sound. These words are Greek in origin.</p>	<p>When a contraction made with 'have' following should, could, would, must or might, the 've sounds similar to of, e.g. would've.</p> <p style="color: blue;">Double contractions are used in speech as part of local dialects. They are highly informal and are good to use for characterisation in dialogue</p>
